The same temple also yielded portions of Sanskrit manuscripts on birch bark, which were of far earlier date, and had no doubt been imported from India. There were further discovered some excellentlypreserved large rolls bearing Buddhist texts in Chinese, and having on the reverse side what was evidently a translation into the unknown language of old Khotan. It may prove that these will furnish the long-desired clue whereby the latter language may be deciphered.
