PROCESSION DID NOT CARRY HOST

Eliminated From Ceremonial at
Asquith's Request As Strife
Was Feared.

London, Sept. 13.—A great procession of Roman Catholic clergymen, which brought the Eucharistic congress to an end, was held this afternoon amid such scenes as the English churchmen, who planned it, never anticipated. Cardinal Vannutelli, the Pope's legate, walked at the head of the procession, wearing his scarlet robes and hat, but not carrying the host. He was accompanied by a bodyguard of English peers, of whom the Duke of Norfolk was the most prominent, and a concourse of cardinals, archbishops and bishops who were attired in unceremonial robes instead of vestments, which originally had been proposed they should wear.

The carrying of the host had been vigorously objected to by the Protestant societies and apparently ended in forcing the Government's hand. At a Catholic meeting held yesterday Archbishop Bourne announced that he had received a communication from Premier Asquith on Thursday deprecating Sunday's procession and advocating its abandonment. This announcement was greeted with groans and cries of "shame" by the assembly.

Eliminate Host.

Continuing, Archbishop Bourne said he had replied to Mr. Asquith that he could not act on a private intimation, whereupon the premier answered that the communication was purely confidential and must not be published. The archbishop insisted that if a change in the proposed programme was necessary Mr. Asquith must take the responsibility of making a public request. The premier replied that in the Government's opinion it would be better in the interests of order and good feeling that the proposed ceremonial, the legality of which was open to question, should not take place.

There were further cries of "shame" from the audience, and after a prolonged interruption Archbishop Bourne continued, saying that he had replied to the premier that "in deference to your wish, all the elements of an ecclesiastical ceremonial will be eliminated."

No such throngs of people have been seen in London since Queen Victoria's funeral if even then, as today. The purpose of Archbishop Bourne, the head of the Westminster diocese and his associates, who arranged the programme, had been to have the host carried through the streets in the rear of Westminster Cathedral, so that the great body of Roman Catholics who were unable to participate in any of the services within the cathedral should have an opportunity of joining the Eucharistic observance and of seeing the high ecclesiastics present in London on this memorable occasion. The procession was laid through the quiet streets leading to the cathedral and but for the unexpected partisan strife which a discussion of this ceremony brought on it probably would have been solemnized quietly and in a reverential atmosphere.

Army of the Curious.

The great majority of those who attempted to witness the spectacle, however, apparently attracted by curiosity, and a small part, were openly and demonstrative hostile. The Catholic element cheered heartily while the procession passed by and throughout the route, but there was heard also a considerable "booming." Long before the hour set for the ceremony it was impossible to get near the line of march and windows and the tops of houses were crowded. The police had not expected such crowds and met with much opposition in their attempts to keep clear, which they hardly succeeded in doing, so that the papal legate and his followers had to push their way through a narrow lane, being frequently and unpleasantly jostled about.

At one place where several streets converge, the crush was so great that the spectators broke up the procession, but the police, stationed at this place in strong force, managed eventually to clear a narrow line through which the papal legate and the others passed in single file.

The crush here was frightful for half an hour, and the police had to use heroic measures. Many women and not a few men fainted, and those who were found wilfully pushing and jostling were carried away in police wagons. It was an anxious time for the officials and reserves who had tried to the scene more to protect the crowd from itself than for any other purpose, for, although there was some isolated cheering, the people were more intent on sight-seeing than on interfering with the Catholics.

On their return to the cathedral the prelates marched around the interior of the edifice, the legate carrying the host, as he would have done in the streets, had not the Government interposed an objection. After the legate appeared on the balcony outside the building and presented the sacred sacrament and pronounced the benediction the vast assemblage that filled the square then sang hymns, and the members of the Catholic societies, with banners flying, marched through the streets to their halls and churches.

HIGH TRIBUTE TO CANADA

KAISER'S CLOSE FRIEND BUYS A
GERHARD HEINTZMAN PIANO.

Baron Von Landsberg Orders One for
His Castle in Germany.

Those Canadians who have of late years taken pride in the phrase, "Made in Canada," will be gratified to learn of an honor which has just been paid to Canadian industry and skill that could hardly be surpassed in its significance. It goes without saying that the late Chancellor of the Exchequer, the Hon. Mr. Bismarck, was struck by the tonal beauty and superb quality of workmanship of a piano exhibited at the Indian and Colonial Exposition by Mr. Gerhard Heintzman, of Toronto, Canada. So much so, indeed, that he purchased it and had it installed in his castle of Friedrichsruhe, where it became the favorite instrument of the ladies of his family.

Now, in Germany, musical taste is more widely diffused and more highly organized than in any other country under the sun. It is a nation whose Kaiser himself is an amateur composer and where the higher forms of music are the recreation of its statesmen. The position of the greatest statesman in its history was naturally an honor prized beyond words by Mr. Gerhard Heintzman, who is one of those "old-fashioned" manufacturers, whose excellence of his output gives greater pleasure than immediate profit. Little did he dream, however, that the incident was to have a sequel.

This summer he took a vacation in Germany, and early in August chanced to meet his Excellency, Baron von Landsberg, one of the greatest men of the German nobility, and possessor of the highest orders in the empire, than whom none stands closer as personal friend and adviser to the Kaiser. The conversation turned on Canada, the baron spoke of the Canadian piano he had heard and admired at Friedrichsruhe. Learning that he was talking to the very man who had made it, he ordered one for his daughter, who is one of the finest musicians and pianists in Germany.

Mr. Heintzman was commanded to visit the castle at Landsberg, and was then decided that the instrument should take the form of a studio grand, built in conformity with the historic furniture of the castle, which is in rich mahogany. Orders were at once cabled to Toronto, and the piano will be shipped to Germany this week.

It must be admitted that so signal an honor from so authoritative a source has seldom been paid to Canadian industry.

GILLETTE'S ADVICE.

Auburn, N. Y., Sept. 12.—A letter written by Chester Gillette, the slayer of Grace Brown, to his brother, Paul, the day before he went to the electric chair was made public by the officials today. It reads in part as follows:

"I give you the (Grace Brown) picture. Whenever you are tempted to do wrong, look at it, and remember your sisters. Be worthy of them."

"A fine thought is to live each day as if it were to be your last. Please forgive me for my mistakes and redeem the Gillette name. Don't oppose mother as many young boys are apt to do. Make her so proud of you that she may not think of me. I wish I had set a better example for you, but take Christ for your example and always follow him."

Gillette killed Grace Brown in July, 1906. He was executed March 29, 1908.

FATALLY INJURED.

Chicago, Sept. 12.—Four women and a man, employees of the Wahl Adding Machine Company, were probably fatally injured today, and several others slightly hurt, by an explosion of illuminating gas in a wall safe in the plant of the company, 405 Ohio street. The explosion occurred when the vault was opened, and an attempt made to light the gas jet. The third and fourth floors of the building were wrecked.
