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

#### QUEBEC TERCENTENARY The Best Dried Fruits THROWN ON CANVAS

Great Pageants Shown and Explained by Mrs. Fitzgibbon of Historical Society.

A very large and appreciative audience gathered in the assembly room of the Normal School to listen to the lecture delivered by Miss Agnes Fitzgibbon, of Toronto, the corresponding secretary of the Ontario Historical Society upon the subject of "The Quebec Tercentenary." The lecture was given under the auspices of the London and Middlesex Historical Society. Mr. Henry Macklin presided.

Miss Fitzgibbon gave a very graphic description of the great pageants that were created to revisualize the events that stood out strongly in the pages of Canadian history.

"I went," said Miss Fitzgibbon, "to see a show; I saw a national event." The speaker also told of the way the French-Canadians who participated in he pageants wore their costumes in

"You would meet in the streets," she said, "courtiers, in gay cloaks and wigs, wearing knee breeches, and with their rapiers dangling at their side, yet they never seemed out of place, and would bow to you with all the grace of Louis XIV, or Frances I., while little French peasant girls ran around the streets in their wooden sabots, as though they had been used to them all their lives."

The Pageants. Miss Fitzgibbon, then went on to describe the different pageants, speaking of the immense pains that had been taken, to make everything historically accurate, and of the magnifi cence with which the project was carried out. The views with which Miss Fitzgib-

bon illustrated her lecture were unusually excellent, and served to give point to her descriptions. At the close of the lecture, a very hearty vote of thanks was moved by Mr. M. D. Fraser and seconded by Mr. T. J. Murphy, expressing the great appreciation of her audience. Fitzgibbon, in replying, mentioned the likelihood of a somewhat similar pageant being held at Niagara in the near future to commemorate the his-toric events of Upper Canade.
