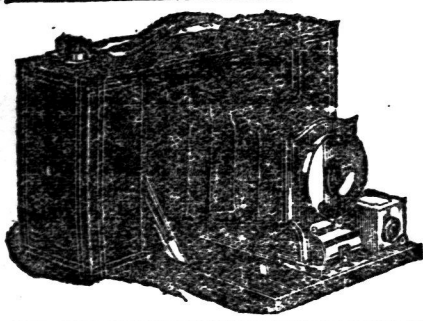

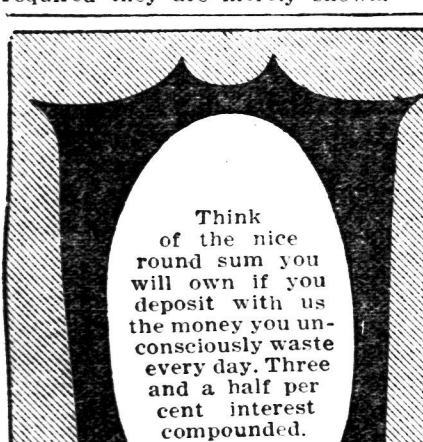

Strikers Conducting the Fight in an Orderly Manner.

All the through passenger trains, both east and west bound, are arriving from one to three hours late. The repair shops here were closed yesterday. These were the number of unemployed. The men held a meeting in the hall over the Bank of Montreal on Tuesday afternoon, but as the press was excluded, no particulars of the meeting could be obtained. No disturbances have taken place as yet, and the men are to be congratulated on the orderly way in which the strike is being conducted. Freight traffic is at a standstill, and unless the situation soon changes there will be a serious congestion at both the Point Edward and town sheds.

Farmers Declare Today's Downpour Just the Thing Wanted.

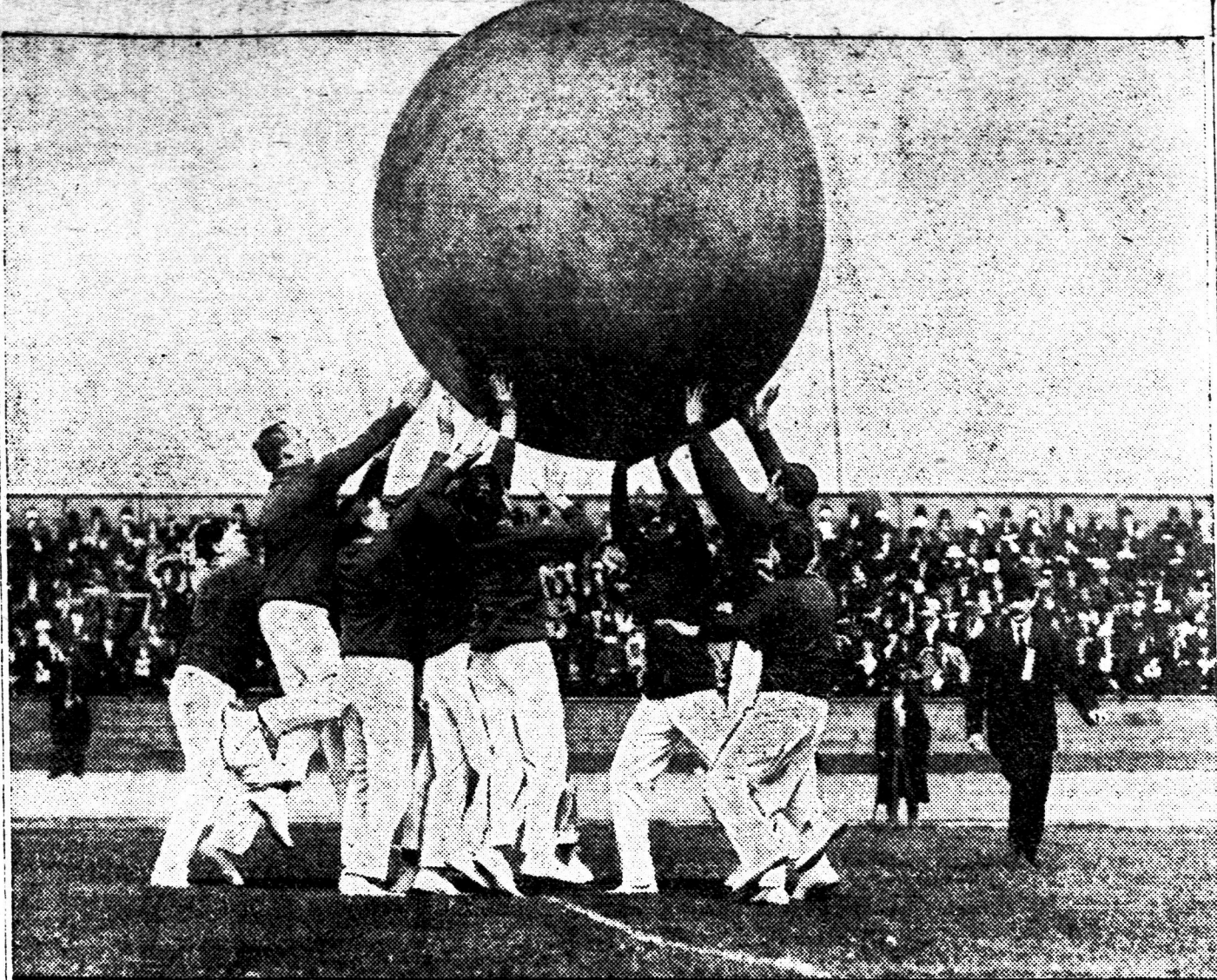

BOTH CLAIM VICTORY

Toronto, July 20.—S. M. Berry, vice-president of the trainmen, says: "The company's troubles will begin when it attempts to move freights."

"There is no doubt as to what the ultimate result of the strike will be. I have learned that the line is completely tied up in the west. The roads are tied up tight. The company is beaten to a frazzle."

"I have been paying close attention to the condition of the railroad service for many years, and I have come to the conclusion that the G. T. R. would never treat their men fairly unless they had to."

"The men are more solid and determined than yesterday," said Chairman Todd, of the striking G. T. R. employees' committee. "We have been receiving reports from all parts of the system, and I am convinced that the whole body of men are unwavering in their loyalty to their obligations. There are, of course, one or two exceptions."

"There is no question about it, the men are beaten," said W. G. Brownlee, general master of transportation, today. "In a few days freight as well as passenger trains will be running as usual."

MANY NEW MEN ARE EMPLOYED BY LOCAL OFFICES OF G. T. R.

Between 75 and 100 Were Taken On by Superintendent Bowker and Staff Yesterday—Scores of Special Constables Sworn In—Strikers Say the Green Men Are a Danger to Themselves and Others.

The close of the second day of the Grand Trunk strike finds the situation practically unchanged with the exception that the entire passenger service is being maintained throughout the night by the use of new men.

All passenger trains in and out of London arrived and departed yesterday and last night much as if there were no strike at all. No attempts have been made to move any freight, and none will be made according to officials, until next week. The men state that they do not expect to see any freight moving next week. If there is to be any trouble at all it is looked for when the company starts moving freight.

Local strikers say they have received the strictest orders not to engage in violence of any kind. "We intend to follow out our instructions too," said one. "Nothing is to be done of that kind."

Prepared for Trouble. The Grand Trunk is prepared for any trouble that may arise. A very large number of men have been sworn in for duty as special constables. Some of them are keeping a close watch around the yards now. Others will be placed as required. In the meantime there has been no disorder at all.

The strikers are very indignant over the proposal to allow 150 strikebreakers, now at Port Huron, to come into Canada as laborers. They claim that nothing could be more unfair. The men expect the railway commission to take some action in stopping green conductors and brakemen from taking trains out.

Charge Made by Men. "A whole lot of those fellows know no more about the rules than a school-boy," said one man. "Such men are a menace to the safety of those travelling. It isn't so bad on a passenger train where there is a good, wide-awake engineer, but if they ever send some of those fellows out on freight trains there is going to be all kinds of trouble."

FINDS GAYNOR IN FAVOR

Ohio Not All For Harmon, Says Democratic Club Leader.

Toledo, July 21.—While there is a sentiment, because of state pride, for the selection of Gov. Judson Harmon as the national standard-bearer of the Democratic party in 1912, Robert J. Beatty, of Columbus, general secretary of the National League of Democratic Clubs, who is in Toledo, says that there is a strong under current in favor of the nomination of William J. Gaynor, mayor of New York.

Beatty is in Toledo for the purpose of furthering organizations of Democratic clubs with the idea of calling a meeting in Columbus in September for the organization of a state association, this to be united then with the national league, which now has 75,000 members. He has visited all the large counties in the state, and has organized them, and has found that there is a belief that Gaynor would make the strongest race.

MIDNIGHT CALL TO THANK PREMIER

Polish Settlement Sends a Delegation to Sir Wilfrid.

THE TARIFF REDUCTION

Tells Yorkton Audience That It Will Be Reduced From Time to Time.

Yorkton, Sask., July 20.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier today addressed the most cosmopolitan gathering of his tour. In addition to a host of Canadians and settlers of British and American origin, which filled through the curling rink, there were Scandinavians, Germans, French, Italians, Poles, Austrians, Armenians, Jews, Doukhobors and Galicians—men, women and children—all of whom gave the Premier a great greeting. The philanthropist in charge of the Victoria Hospital observed "big day," the Premier, Minister of Railways and party being early decorated by the enterprising young ladies.

Visits Wheat Fields. In the morning Sir Wilfrid was driven out into the country, where he waded waist deep in great fields of ripening wheat and oats. The crops were never in better condition locally he was told. In the afternoon he was driven around Yorkton, escorted by the Royal Northwest Mounted Police under Major J. M. Clarke and a Torontoian, and a corps of mounted naval cadets. The streets were decorated elaborately, and magnificent arches of wheat spanned the thoroughfares. Major J. M. Clarke and President J. A. A. Patrick presented the civic address of welcome, and the Saskatchewan Grain Growers' Association memorialized the Premier for free and reciprocal trade, and the early construction of the Hudson's Bay Railway. The Premier promised a response at the English language.

Shortly after midnight there was an earnest knocking at the door of Sir Wilfrid's car. The porter found a quiet, respectful-looking farmer. It was difficult to understand his broken language.

"Me message Mr. Laurier," was all the attendant could get out of him. The Premier had retired after a busy day, and Hon. Geo. P. Graham was awakened. The minister interviewed the visitor and received a letter of appreciation for the welcome and treatment of the settlers, expressing gratitude for Sir Wilfrid's greeting of citizenship, and pledging themselves to do their part, as he had asked, in building up a new Canadian home country under the British flag.

The letter was delivered when the Premier rose in the morning, and so pleased was Sir Wilfrid that he forthwith wrote a personal autograph letter tendering his thanks and wishing the community godspeed in their patriotic and worthy aims.

Tariff Reduction. Dealing with the tariff, Sir Wilfrid reminded the audience of the allegory of the limbs of the body, who protested they worked all the time to feed the stomach, which did nothing for itself. So they decided to starve the stomach, and thereby became weak themselves. "That is much the same with the body politic," said the Premier. "When all interests work together the best results are obtained. The tariff will be reduced from time to time," said Sir Wilfrid.

Reciprocity. In reference to the United States' offer for reciprocity in agricultural machinery, Sir Wilfrid said he would only consider the offer when they included not only complete machinery, but all its parts. The United States was a manufacturing country second only to Great Britain. Canada was
