

Mother Earth Is Hefty

New York, Sept. 9.—Mother Earth weighs 7,000,000,000,000 tons. Reinhard A. Wetzel, instructor in physics at the College of the City of New York, finished today a series of experiments by which he has compiled the weight of this mundane sphere. According to Mr. Wetzel the result is more accurate than has hitherto been obtained.

The apparatus used in the experiments was so extremely delicate that they were carried on entirely after midnight to avoid even the jarring of footfalls in the farthest corridor.
