Londoners whose appetites are stimulated three times daily by an extra slice of bread must bear the brunt of the blow which follows a boost of one cent on the price of

Announcement of this increase in price was made today, the bakers re sponsible for it attributing the cause to fluctuations in the wheat market.

The increase comes as a surprise to consumers in view of the fact that wheat was recently quoted at a dollar per bushel, with indications of a steady drop in prices. At that time the 24-ounce loaf was reduced to retail at nine cents in London, with citizens of Windsor, St. Thomas, Galt and other towns in the district remaining on the ten-cent list.

In contrast to the former price wheat is now on the market at \$1.42 According to figures made available by F. E. Parnell of the Parnell Baking Company, there are 4 1-2 bushels of wheat to every barrel of flour, and the jump in the market increases flour \$1.89 per bar
