Unemployment Parley Adopts Resolution Favoring Aid in Deserving Cases.

DIVIDE BURDEN

Recommends All Public Work Possible Should Be Started at Once.

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, Sept. 4.-The unemployment conference, called by the federal government, came to a close shortly before midnight with the adoption of a report embodying a number of recommendations for meeting conditions of unemployment throughout Canada.

The report, which was drafted by special committee appointed at yesterday's session, made the important recommendation that emergency member relief should be granted when after full and careful investigation it was found to be necessary. The expense of such relief it was stated should of such relief, it was stated, should sitting, was as follows, in part: be borne by the federal, provincial and municipal authorities on the Carmania basis of 50 per cent by the municibasis of 50 per cent by the municipality and 25 per cent each by the province and the Dominion by the province and the Dominion province and the Dominion.
