

PRINCE TO LEAVE THURSDAY NIGHT

Wales Not Likely To Stay For Final International Polo Game.

TRAVEL BY MOTOR

Sydney, N. Y., Sept. 14.—The Prince of Wales will probably make his delayed departure for Canada next Thursday night, it was said today at the Borden home, the Long Island vacation residence of the prince and party.

It is expected that the second polo game, to be played Tuesday, will probably be won by the U. S. team, and in that case the prince will not stay for the final match. The prince and party, however, thoroughly enjoyed the game on Saturday, and especially the brilliant playing of Louis Lacey, the Canadian-Argentine player.

During the next four days the prince and his staff plan to enjoy themselves more informally than ever. Their social program is not fixed. The dinners and dancing parties that were arranged long in advance have been given. There will be dinner parties arranged on the spur of the moment as the prince likes.

The prince today put his golf bag in his motor car and went to the home of Harrison Williams, Glen Cove, had some golf and proceeded afterwards to dinner at the home of Julius Fleischmann in Port Washington.

It is reported that the prince might motor to Canada, thus getting a good view of the Green Mountains, and then take the train at Montreal. But present plans, which are being made by the Canadian National Railway, call for a long trip from Glen Cove, Long Island, across the Sound to New London, Conn.

Mrs. Albert Couse of Yarmouth Centre Is Brutally Beaten.

YOUTH DISAPPEARS

Little Girl Finds Mother Unconscious in Pool of Blood.

St. Thomas, Sept. 14.—Brutally attacked while she lay in bed, Mrs. Albert Couse of Yarmouth Centre, a mother of three children, is now in a critical condition. As the result of the crime, which was one of the most vicious in the history of Elgin county, John Hammer, sixteen-year-old Barnardo Home boy, is being sought by the county police.

Mrs. Couse, who is the wife of a well-known farmer living on East Talbot street, was found early Saturday morning by her five-year-old daughter Doris lying unconscious in a pool of blood. The child notified neighbors and county officers were called. They found the room ransacked, the ceiling and walls splashed and the bedclothes wet with blood.

Husband Away.

Mrs. Couse was in Toronto on a business trip, and had left with his wife and family the young English boy, who had been employed by him since early summer. The boy has disappeared.

Mrs. Couse's assailant attacked her with a sharp-edged instrument and inflicted three gruesome wounds on the victim's head. Police believe that he entered Mrs. Couse's room late Friday evening with the intention of stealing her purse, but on finding his victim awake made a murderous assault on her.

Unable to summon assistance, Mrs. Couse lay in a bleeding condition for four or six hours before being discovered by her daughter. Her assailant rifled the room and fled with \$20, which he found in Mrs. Couse's purse.

A description of Hammer has been sent to police in all large centers, while farmers are scouring the district for him. The young English lad was a favorite in the neighborhood, and the Couse family had implicit confidence in him. The fact that he was the only grown person in the house besides Mrs. Couse, and his sudden disappearance after the attack, led police to believe that he was the perpetrator of the crime, he knows a great deal about it.

Door Is Locked.

When the crime had been committed, Mrs. Couse's assailant locked the door of the bedroom, which was opened by little Doris Couse four hours later.

Doris declared that Mrs. Couse was suffering from great loss of blood and a broken skull. Despite her feeble condition, however, it is believed she will live.

Police are of the opinion that the person responsible for the deed entered the room armed with a weapon he had picked up outside the house. The deep gashes in Mrs. Couse's head indicate that the instrument was something like a heavy fish spear.

If, as they suspect, the assault was committed by young Hammer, the police think that he took a train to Niagara, where he was once employed, or jumped the late express for Hamilton. Police at both these places have been instructed to be on the lookout for him.

Mr. Couse returned from Toronto as soon as word of the affair reached him and visited his wife in her room at the hospital. Mrs. Couse was too weak to give a coherent account of the attack except to say that on hearing the prowler's footsteps she cried out.

Give Description.

Hammer is described as being sixteen years of age, five feet seven inches in height, dark complexion, dark hair and brown eyes. He has a pronounced Cockney accent, and was said to have been wearing a blue suit on the day of the crime.

Mrs. Couse, who is 28 years old, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Emery, Weldon avenue, this city. Late Sunday evening hospital authorities stated she had shown a slight improvement since Saturday morning.

MANCHURIAN CHIEF MOVES ON PEKING

Chang Tso Lin Begins Advance—Report Capture of Town.

Shanghai, Sept. 14.—Two messages from Mukden given out today by Secretary Loh of Chanking defence headquarters here, reported that firing began last night at Shan-hai-kuan in Chihli province at the Manchurian border and in the Jehol district in the heart of Chihli, 125 miles northwest of Shan-hai-kuan, and about 100 miles northeast of Peking.

The second message reported the capture of Tsao Yang near Jehol.

These messages, if confirmed, will indicate that Chang Tso Lin, the Manchurian field marshal, is moving his troops on Peking from two directions in his effort to overthrow the government there.

SEND JAP WARSHIP. Tokyo, Sept. 14.—The navy department has ordered the second class coast warship Desushima from the Sasebo naval base to Shanghai with a party of 300 men. Another company of marines has left the Kuro naval base for the same destination.

TWO STUDENTS DROWN WHEN CANOE CAPSIZES

G. Wood and A. Davies of Toronto University Die Near Peterboro.

Canadian Press Despatch. Peterboro, Sept. 14.—Two undergraduates of the University of Toronto, Gerald Wood, age 19, and Alfred Davies, age 20, were drowned in Rice Lake, near Potash Island, when the canoe capsized in a sudden squall Saturday night.

The boys were paddling to Peterboro to the camp of a friend near Keene when overtaken by the storm. Gerald Wood was the son of R. C. Wood, and Davies the son of Mrs. Caroline Davies, both of Toronto. The bodies have not yet been recovered.

Toronto Orphans Are Given Picnic

J. D. O'Connell Entertains More Than 4,000 Children.

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, Sept. 14.—More than 4,000 children were present Saturday afternoon at Exhibition Park when J. D. O'Connell, the "picnic king," gave his first picnic to orphans and poor children of Toronto. Every orphan in the city, of which there were about 1,000, received, in addition to sharing in the general distribution of candy and food, a 25-cent bill and five bright new coppers.

Mr. O'Connell has been giving picnics for 29 years, on an average of one a week, from his own resources, and announces that he is amply rewarded by the happiness he brings to poor children.

FORMER LONDON WOMAN DIES IN MONTREAL HOSPITAL

Canadian Press Despatch. Montreal, Sept. 14.—Miss Sarah L. Holland, formerly of London, Ont., and for the past ten years a resident of this city, died this afternoon at the Western Hospital in her 71st year. She had been ill for several weeks and underwent an operation ten days ago from which she did not recover. Miss Holland is survived by two brothers, W. C. and John Holland, both of Toronto. Interment will be made in London.

NEW U. S. RUM CHASERS MAKE FIRST SEIZURE

Bridgeburg, Ont., Sept. 14.—The new United States rum chasers now on active patrol on the Niagara River captured on Saturday a 34-foot vessel, which was found tied to a dock at Grange Island with a cargo of 200 cases of Canadian ale. Thomas Davis of Chippawa and Edward Ackerman of Black Rock, who were found on the vessel, were arrested. The vessel was seized, O.T.A. and three for reckless driving.

WILL BE ALLOWED VOTE SUPERVISOR

Ontario Government Passes Orders-in-Council To Appoint Officers.

FOR PLEBISCITE

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, Sept. 14.—The Ontario cabinet on Saturday passed an order-in-council permitting the Moderation League and the prohibition forces to appoint representatives in each riding who will have the same authority in the plebiscite on the liquor question to be taken October 23 as candidates in a parliamentary election.

Hon. W. F. Nickle, attorney-general, stated that the representatives so appointed would be permitted to nominate their agents and supervise the activities of scrutineers. It will be a straight "yes" or "no" vote that will be received by the usual method of marking an X in the chosen place.

Premier Ferguson said yesterday: "It is quite obvious that a voter cannot consistently vote yes or no on both questions, but no decision has yet been reached as to whether a ballot so marked will be regarded as spoiled."

GOVERNMENT PARTY OVERTHROWN IN CHILI

Military Government Takes Charge of Affairs in South American Country.

Santiago, Chile, Sept. 14.—Chili's political institutions have ceased to exist, their duties being taken over yesterday by the military government council made up of General Luis Alparmarino as vice-president and General Guan Pablo Bunnett and Vice-Admiral Guzm Nef and a civilian cabinet of six secretaries, headed by Alvarado Rodan.

This state of affairs is the outcome of a series of political happenings which culminated in the overthrow of the government of Alessandri some days ago.

When the government failed to get parliamentary approval of its recent measure the military and naval chiefs took matters into their own hands and the resignation of Premier Alessandri followed.

Plans have been made for the establishment of a new constitutional government, drawing up a constitution and the election of a new parliament.

POSTAL EMPLOYEES RESTORED TO OLD PAY

Forty Men Resume Positions at Toronto—Conditions Now Satisfactory.

Special to The Advertiser. Toronto, Sept. 14.—Conditions at the local postoffice are now quiet and satisfactory. The men have been restored to their old rates of pay prevailing before the strike.

Forty have resumed the official positions held prior to the dispute. The payment of salaries in force prior to the strike this summer created a jubilant feeling among the Toronto postal workers on Saturday. The men, following the failure of the strike, had been paid a lower scale and many of them were reduced in position for a probationary period. This period has now expired.

EXPECT RATIFICATION OF LABOR CONVENTION

Director of Labor Bureau Believes That European Countries Favor Move.

Associated Press Despatch. Paris, Sept. 14.—Premier Herriot is described by those near him as disposed later in the year to take up the question of France's debt to the United States, but has not yet committed himself positively on the question.

The premier is said to be receptive to opinions prevailing both in the ministry of finance and the foreign office that the time is near for the French government to enter into definite engagements for payment of the debt.

The ministry of finance has prepared several alternative projects at different rates of interest and percentages of amortization. One of these is a general line of the five-year moratorium, 2 1/2 per cent interest 1/2 per cent sinking fund, at which rate the debt could be paid off within 60 or 70 years. This plan would be equivalent of about 70 per cent of the total obligations and compares with 5 per cent interest, which the debt now bears, and one per cent amortization.

BROTHERHOOD URGED TO BACK PROHIBITION

First Autumn Service Was Held at Askin Street Church Yesterday.

Rev. J. E. J. Millyard, the new pastor at Askin Street Methodist Church, was the speaker yesterday morning, when the Brotherhood of the church commenced its autumn services. Rev. Mr. Millyard spoke on "The Religion of a Brotherhood Man."

Askin Street Brotherhood is one of the largest in the city, and conducts a forceful series of Sunday morning meetings every autumn and winter. They meet at 10 o'clock for a 45-minute session before the morning church service.

A call has been issued to Brotherhood men to rally to the prohibition forces. Intense co-operation is asked for in an effort to carry a temperance triumph in the coming plebiscite on Oct. 23.

ROMNEY SCHOOL FAIR IS HELD AT WHEATLEY
