Market House Removal Urged To Provide More Selling Room For Farmers

IMPROVING MARKET DISTRICT IS URGED

Mayor Believes Scrapping Market House Would Bring New Stores.

PROMISES ACTION

Scrapping of the present market house is suggested today in the presentation of a new angle to the market tangle. This morning the idea was set forth in order that bona fide farmers and gardeners would secure more space on the market, a desire they have long fortered. they have long fostered.

With the tearing down of the old sheds, which now house leased stalls of a dozen or fifteen butchers, these butchers would be virtually forced off the market. But, it is pointed out, that they would likely they that they would likely then secure property on Talbot and King streets, fronting on the market, put in shops there, and help to build up this area as a better business district.

Not Needed. "The market house isn't really needed. The space for farmers and gardeners is needed. Get the butcher stalls out of there, and they'll heip build up the surrounding district."

The mayor promises to bring up this suggestion at this week's session of No. 1 committee of the council. He is also keen to have the 80 per cent lause put back in the bylaw. This would govern the hucksters on the market, so that they would have to provide an affidavit that they were producers of four-fifths of the mer chandise which they had for sale.

There appears to be some disrup-tion in the ranks of No. 1 committee today regarding the day for meeting this week. Under ordinary circum stances the session is scheduled for Wednesday, but the mayor points out that several aldermen and himself will be out of town that evening, and wants Thursday substituted.
