GRAND JURY ACTION
AWAITS COLBORNE MEN
Captured While Attempting to Land Liquor at Dunkirk.

Buffalo, Oct. 2.—Federal grand jury action awaits George King and Joseph McIntyre, both of Port Colborne, Ont., who were captured recently by coastguardsmen of the Erie, Pa., station, who charge they were attempting to land a cargo of liquor near Dunkirk. The Port Colborne men appeared before United States Commissioner Cook here this morning, and following preliminary hearing were held in \$4,000 bail for the grand jury.

Another alleged rum-running venture was foiled today when the coastguardsmen seized a 40-foot cabin cruiser containing 350 cases of whiskey, after the craft had been abandoned by its crew. The rum-runners escaped in a speed boat.

UNITE AT JOLLY GATHERING

Clubmen From Galt and Brantford Are Guests of Londoners.

INTERESTING TALK
Archdeacon Fotheringham Speaks On "Romance of the Dollar."

Visiting a world of better men coming together in good fellowship to be delivered of all selfishness as individuals and as nations through the exercised gift of imagination, Archdeacon Fotheringham of Brantford last night addressed the members of the Kiwanis clubs of London, Galt and Brantford at the Tecumseh Hotel.

The Brantford club had charge of the entertainment. By motor cars, bus and train, 25 members of Galt and Brantford clubs came through the town to visit the local branch.

Archdeacon Fotheringham spoke on "Romance in Industry." Behind every dollar that went into trade was something to stir the imagination. The mere dollar might be something common, soild but if those who handled it in the mills and across the counters thought of it as something that linked up nations and nations, the dollar was the most romantic thing in the world.

Money As Power.
The dollar represented a tear, a lie, the bread of children, said the speaker. Man could go out over the world in terms of money. His imagination could lift it from a thing metallic to something great and wonderful.

Through money, individuals and nations could lift themselves to such heights that they would disregard self and actual down to the very depths of service.

In business all manner of things were dealt with. From the far-off corners of the world, goods came for the tables of Canadians. Citizens of the dominion could not live to themselves alone. They brought riches from Africa and they sent bidders to Russia.

In the old days when commerce first started on the high seas there was the romance of opening up new countries. The risk of sailing brought with it adventure, opportunity and wealth and glory.

The wealth in adventure brought the glory of service for after all, though money was the coin by which trading was done, men through their products were dealing in human lives.

Means of Service.
Archdeacon Fotheringham pleaded for an exercising of the imaginative gifts so that business could be raised to a level where each man would think first of the service that his product would render to his fellow-man at home and abroad, so that the individuals of the world could come together in the golden glory of a perfect understanding.

The evening was one of the liveliest seen in Kiwanis clubs in some time. Both of the visiting clubs brought musicians.

Shortly after the guests were welcomed at seven o'clock, Tom Yuli turned the meeting over to W. J. Feldcamp, president of the Brantford club, who called upon the entertainers for their numbers.

There was a special song of 13 verses, which included the names of prominent members. After the singing, a popularity contest was held. The winners were: Carlton Wells, Cliff Mann, Harry McCallum, A. W. Cairns, C. E. J. Hickey, Bridge-man, Bill Anderson, Frank McDonald.

The Brantford string quartet composed of W. J. Feldcamp, Larry Barnes, Jack Bawtinbimer and K. Kukla, entertained with several numbers.

George Bell and Percy Kay, the Galt harmonizers, sang Dear Little Home of My Dreams and other selections.

Hong Kong, Oct. 2.—The Hong Kong stock exchange, closed since early June, when the anti-foreign strike demoralized business here, will reopen October 5.

FRANCE APPROVES

CAILLAUX'S STAND

Disappointment Tempered by Relief in Rejection of Initial Offer.

Associated Press Despatch.
Paris, Oct. 2.—Downright disappointment over the failure of Finance Minister Caillaux to come to an agreement at Washington on the funding of France's debt to the United States is mingled with unconcealed approval of M. Caillaux's stand, refusing what is characterized here as "the unnecessarily hard conditions" imposed by the United States debt commission, in the committee of the French press and the people as the minister of finance begins his homeward journey.

The disappointment is tempered by a certain relief that the ultimate offer of the French negotiators, which Paris experts contend would have strained France's resources to the limit, has been rejected.

In the absence of Foreign Minister Briand at Locarno, Switzerland, and Premier Painleve at Nimes, no official opinion is forthcoming on behalf of the French government. In official circles it is explained that no such expression can be made until M. Caillaux has laid the situation before the cabinet council upon his return to Paris.

Associated Press Despatch.
Richmond, Va., Oct. 2.—Tom Mason, locomotive engineer, is believed to have been killed and six negro workmen are missing as the result of a cave-in of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway tunnel at Churchville today, which trapped more than 40 men engaged in reinforcing its walls. Most of the workmen, however, dug themselves out of the fallen earth and crawled to safety, and police officials declared that little hope was held out for any remaining in the tunnel.

Gases drove the rescuers from the tunnel shortly after midnight and it was believed that any entombed in the passageway could not survive the poisonous fumes.

Police indicated that rescue operations would not be continued until tomorrow.

Engineer Mason is believed to be buried in his locomotive which was completely covered with earth. His brother, D. P. Moseley, and A. G. Adams, a brakeman, both escaped. They were severely scalded by steam which poured from the twisted boiler of the engine.

Liverpool, Oct. 2.—Arthur Henderson, secretary for home affairs in the late Labor government, with his son and other Labor members of the House of Commons, sailed today on the steamer Megantic to attend the inter-parliamentary conference at Ottawa. Later the party will visit the United States.
