Washington, May 5.—At a meeting of the Sub-Committee of the House Committee on the Pacific Railroad this evening, resolutions were adopted favoring the construction of a railroad on the 32d parallel, and for giving a franchise to the Southern Trans-Continental Company.

Washington, May 5.—A private conference was held yesterday at Sheriff O'Brien's office of the leaders of the Young Democracy for the purpose, it is rumored, of agreeing upon the terms of coalition to be offered to the other wing of the party.

Washington, May 5.—The War Department sent a telegram to-day to Fort Fetterman granting the request of Red Cloud and twelve of his principal chiefs to come to this city and see the President. The Indian Agent is instructed to make the necessary arrangements.

Morgan today presented additional petitions asking Congress to abolish National Banks and redeem the bonds deposited by them as security; to issue fifty million treasury notes and make the same receivable for custom dues and all other taxes collected by the Federal Government; to pay off the bonded debt bills passed to aid in the construction of the Oregon branch of the Pacific Railroad, and authorizing the Southern Mississippi Railroad to connect their line with the Northern Pacific.

Washington, May 5.—A bill has been introduced in the Senate providing for a reduction of taxes as follows:—Income, \$1,000,000. Sales \$8,750,000. Gross receipts, \$650,000. Of special taxes, upwards of \$9,000,000. Of other smaller amounts—Total \$43,507,000. Taxes on distilled spirits, fermented liquors, gas, and income at 3 percent, are left in force. All taxes are collected by stamps.

CHARLESTON, S. C., May 5.—The Immigration Convention have taken measures for the introduction of Chinese, labor when deemed advantageous.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The American Medical Association exclude delegates from the institution in the District of Columbia who recognize colored physicians.

NEW YORK, May 5.—In the McFarland trial the evidence was closed and the argument will take place to-morrow.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The Northern Pacific Land Grant Bill was considered and the previous question ordered. The remainder of the session was occupied in debating a motion to prevent its passage.

ST. LOUIS, May 5.—There are reports that bands of marauding Indians are threatening the settlers on Salmon river in Kansas. The Central Railroad will be protected by the military.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—The receipts from revenue for the first nine months of the current fiscal year have been \$127,266,534.

The American Medical Association refuses to admit women delegates.

NEW YORK, May 6.—The Cuban League Club elected an executive committee. A conference outside of the Democratic organization will be held to-morrow, organizing an opposition to Tammany, at Music Hall. The Cuban General Jordan and staff have arrived here to procure munitions of war. He visits Washington and returns to Cuba. It is reported the campaign in Cuba is substantially ended for the present and resulted in favor of the Cubans, who are in better condition than ever and the success of the revolution depends only on time. It numbers 10,000 well-equipped men, supplied with artillery and mountain howitzers sufficient for present service. Jordan left Cuba in a small steamer. When three days out he was chased by four Spanish gunboats, but during a storm he eluded them.

NEW YORK, May 7.—There was an explosion of fruit glycerine in the Midland Railroad tunnel near Wartboro, yesterday afternoon. One workman was blown 300 feet into the air and torn to pieces.

Councils of the Pentecost become daily more frequent and secret. Yesterday Gen O'Neill and members of the executive council appointed by the late Congress, arrived in this city to confer with him in regard to the approaching expedition. A meeting was held last evening at a late hour, the result of which has not transpired, but it has been ascertained the object of the meeting was to decide on the time when a movement shall take place. The Council meets again to-day.

CHICAGO, May 7.—Reports from all parts of the Northwest speak of the great damage by the storm of Thursday night. At Council Bluffs a new church was entirely demolished. At Springfield, Ill., houses and barns were unroofed, fences and stacks blown down and the country flooded. The storm seems to have been general throughout the State.

EUROPE.

PARIS, May 4.—Arrivals of members of the International Society at Strasbourg and Ronen continue. It is estimated that more than 2000 persons have been arrested since Saturday.

BRASIL, May 3.—There is great indignation here against the Committee of the Stock Exchange for warning the public against recently issued American railroad securities. The premature action of the committee here caused much inconvenience. Official broker's share lists have refused to quote the securities.

LONDON, May 4.—Princess Helena, wife of Prince Christian, gave birth to a daughter to-day.

LONDON, May 5.—It is reported that Spain has suspended action on the new Constitution of Porto Rico and will consider no proposition for the sale of Cuba.

The Gaulois reports that Olivier will soon exchange the Department of Justice for that of Foreign Affairs.

LONDON, May 6.—Dispatches from the Governor General of Canada confirming the settlement of the Red River troubles were read by Earl Granville in the House of Lords.

PARIS, April 6.—The Journal Officiel contains a decree of conviction of the High Court of Justice for the trial of those arrested and implicated in the plot against the Emperor. It is reported that government has demanded of the English Government the extradition of Gustave Flourens on account of his complicity in the plot against the Emperor.

The Siecle explains the situation as follows: The Government asks unqualified approval of past acts and a carte blanche for the future. Traces of conspiracy have been discovered at Marseilles.

Colorado Territory.

DENVER, May 5.—Accounts of Indian outrages on the Kansas Pacific Railroad and elsewhere in Colorado recently published by Eastern newspapers are entirely groundless. There have been no Indian troubles in this Territory during the past year.

Wyoming Territory.

SOUTH PASS, May 4.—A party of 300 Indians came in near Atlantic City this morning and drove off a herd of stock. Major Jordan's company of cavalry followed them and recovered the stock. Col Anthony, who has just come in from Atlantic City says the hills are full of Indians. A large party of Indians were seen below here this morning.

California.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 6.—Sydney dates of March 26th quote flour at £14 for Adelaide and £13 10s for Sydney made. The cargo of California flour per Naiad, sold in one lot at £11 10s, equal to \$5 52 per barrel. Wheat by the same vessel brought over 56d, or \$2.20 per cental. The range for other kinds of wheat was 5s to 6s 6d. California oats sold at 3s per bushel. Lumber dull and prices nominal.

A dividend of \$1 per share was declared to-day by the Chollar Potosi Mining Company, payable on the 10th inst.

Mrs Charles Cook was attacked by robbers on Clay street between Jones and Leavenworth at 8 o'clock last evening, but her screams brought the neighbors out and the robbers decamped.

The steamer Idaho, which arrived yesterday from Honolulu, brought a large colonial mail for England. Most of the Australian passengers also go to England via railroad and New York steamers. The passengers are much disappointed at finding they have been imposed upon by representations that the fare from San Francisco to New York was only \$50 by railroad.

To-day was the warmest of the season. The thermometer at 3 p.m. stood at 80°, and at sunset at 76°.

The second game of the billiard tournament to-day between Gates and McCleary resulted in favor of Gates by 1001 in 73 innings against 733 in 72 innings by McCleary. Excitement still prevails among the workmen on the question of granting a subsidy to the Southern Pacific Railroad. Further guarantees are wanted that Chinese labor will not be employed.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 6.—Flour—Oregon extra \$4.90, Marysville extra \$5.25, now held at \$5.50. We quote expensive in sacks at \$4.62@4.75. Extra \$5.25@5.50 per 196 pounds.

Wheat—Market quiet but firm, holders asking \$1.70@1.75 per 100 pounds for choice parcels.

Barley—Brewing \$1.35, with an offer of \$1.40 made for 5000 sacks of the same. It is reported that 2000 sacks have been sold at \$1.50. It would be difficult, perhaps, to prepare a round lot of choice brewing for a less figure; at the same time it is noteworthy that most of the lots which have changed hands have been on account of speculators and not consumers. It is difficult to predict what course the market will ultimately take. We learn that as high as \$1.60 was offered this morning. The market is very feverish and speculative rampant. The legitimate demand is nominal.
