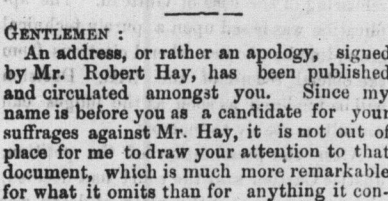

A REPLY TO MR. ROBERT HAY'S ADDRESS.

To the Electors of Centre Toronto.



GENTLEMEN: In address, or rather an apology, signed by Mr. Robert Hay, has been published and circulated amongst you.

Mr. Hay says the country is prosperous, and, without debt, is patronizing its own products, and is increasing its annual expenditure over five and a half million dollars, as proved by their estimates of last session; and has increased the customs taxation from less than twelve million dollars in 1878 to over twenty million dollars, as estimated for this year; and has also increased the national debt by fifteen million dollars in the three years from 1878 to 1881!

It would no doubt have been interesting if Mr. Hay had told you why he supported the granting of the contract to build the Canada Pacific railway without calling for tenders; why he voted down an offer by other responsible men to build it for \$3,000,000 and 3,000,000 acres of land, less than the Syndicate's proposal; why he voted to give the syndicate a trading monopoly of the Northwest trade for twenty years, except from taxation, and privileges without number, which were not asked by the other company.

You have also missed a great deal in not hearing from Mr. Hay what reasons could have led him to vote against the right of the province of Ontario to legislate about her own local affairs, and how he came to insist on the interlocking of the patriotism of the Canadian people when he voted against the right of Canada to make her own commercial treaties.

When the last few days of the session just closed, the final stab was given to Ontario, when the government introduced their scandalous and cowardly gerrymandering bill. They had to give this provision to the opposition, and to elect Mr. Hay again, in fulfilment of the promise that had been made to the electors of Centre Toronto.
