

CONTAGION IN CATTLE.

MR. G. F. FRANKLAND DENIES THE RUMOR.

How 500 Head of Cattle Were Kept in the Heat on the Liverpool Docks—Was Don't the Government Do Its Own Work?

THE STRIKE BECOMING STALE

Four Weeks Old To-Day—A Recurrent Member of the Brotherhood.

New York, Aug. 15.—Superintendent Hampton, of the Western Union, says the company requires operators to work each day applying for work that he will not just any organization of the rules of which will interfere with his duties to the company.

At noon a committee of six of the striking operators formerly employed by the Western Union, obtained an interview with Gen. Eckert.

John Campbell, master workman of the telegraphers' brotherhood, sent a letter to Gen. Eckert this afternoon stating that his receipt of the committee of independent telegraphers today was a great surprise.

Master Workman Campbell said there were no signs of weakening on the part of the brotherhood.

Mr. Eckert's ultimatum was that the operators to effect a reconciliation have proved futile in the intention of the brotherhood to ignore Eckert's ultimatum and carry on the fight with renewed vigor.
