occupied thirteen years; yet its capacity is

the shancture contains nothing but an opera the structure contains nothing but an opera-house. It is furthermore pronounced in-ferior both in beauty and in its practical features. This is true of all the great opera-houses of Europe, including those of Vienna, Frankfort, Dresden, Berlin, and Milan. Most Frankfort, Dresden, Berlin, and Milan. Most of these have grand approaches and splendid vestibules, embellished with costly freecess and statuary which governments have paid for; but the interiors are a disappointment, and lacking in practical details as compared with the Chicago Auditorium. They are all smaller in capacity, exclusive boxes occupying much of the space. They are built for the few rather than for the masses—the titled and the wealthy rather than for the people lacking the broad democratic policy of pro-viding for all which prevails in the arrange-ment of your Auditorum, thereby lessening the gulf between the classes.
