

### WHAT ROADSIDE INFANT.

The Child's Father and Mother are Bro and Sister.

Famous, July 31.--About two months ago, it will be remembered, a healthy infant of a few weeks' old was deserted on the road between Ferguson and Orangeville. The child-deserter has since turned out to be Alexander Watson, a well-known and wealthy Caledon farmer, and he and his 16-year-old daughter were arrested last week on a charge of child-desertion and taken to Guelph, afterwards regarding their liberty by furnishing substantial bail. Since his arrest Watson has made a clean breast of the affair.

The child's mother is one of his daughters, a rather nice-looking and fairly intelligent girl, who was only 19 years of age last March, and his father is his son, a lazy, slovenly, unclean fellow, aged 37. The natural intimacy was going on between them for nearly two years and a half, and first commenced before the girl was 14 years of age.

Watson is a prosperous farmer, lives in a fine brick house, and owns and works 200 acres. He has a large family and is extensively connected in the township on both his own side and on the side of his wife. It was for the sake of this connection, he says, that he took his daughter away to Waterloo poorhouse, where the child was born, and left the child on the roadside, but now that the exposure has come out he expresses an anxiety to do anything in his power to bring his second-born son to justice and have him punished with the most extreme rigor of the law. He is now supposed to be in Toronto, and efforts will immediately be made to secure his arrest if possible.

### Strange Freedom of Speech.

From The Week.

It seemed strange to hear Pastor Wilkinson on Monday night asking the council, in the name of freedom of speech, to amend the by-law about park preaching, so as to allow the services of the Salvation Army and the Gospel preachers to be carried on. That would be "strange freedom of speech," to say the least, that only those who believe as do Mr. Wilkinson and his followers should be allowed to speak; but this is quite in keeping with the ideas held by them. They believe that they only are right, so of course everyone else must be wrong, they are the only people who are trying to do their fellowmen any good, so they must be allowed to talk to them and the others released. This is the freedom of speech, and it is a wonder that Mr. Wilkinson did not see the absurdity of his position. It is more than absurd, it is grossly unfair. To say that a man must hold the religious opinions that are considered the correct thing by the churches to secure the right to speak is a marvelous argument for freedom of speech. It must be all or none, either everyone should be allowed to air his own peculiar views or all must keep silence. That is the only fair thing to be done, and it resolves itself into the question, which will give the greatest freedom to the greatest number? I still hold that quietness will do this, but after the happening of last Sunday I am not so sure that the by-law is the best means of securing it. It appears to be a hard matter to safely guard the rights of all, to give such freedom to do as please, and set the same limit prevent that freedom from interfering with that of others. I do not in the least abandon my position that the freedom of quiet is just as precious as the freedom of speech, I only question whether the means adopted be the most effectual means of securing such.

I cannot agree with those who hold that they have a perfect right to force their opinions upon those who desire a quiet afternoon in the Park, but I admit honestly that the attempt to enforce the by-law on Sunday has convinced me that it is a mistake. What would be the result if we accomplish the desired end and I do not know, but surely some can be devised that will not cut an equal measure to all. For myself, while I have often felt like speaking, and have been asked to do so on Sunday afternoons, I cannot see that I have a right to compel others to listen to me in the park, and as long as this is the consequence of such speaking I intend to refrain from it and let the difficulty and reluctantly admit that I can see no other.

### BORROWED A DOLLAR TO DIE.

Samuel Newell of Rushton Found in a Barn in a Dying Condition.

SHELBRURNE, July 31.--Samuel Newell of lot 25, con. 4, E.H.S., Mulmur, was found in a dying condition in the loft of a stable on another farm owned by him some distance from his place of residence, being lot 20, con. 3. He left home with a horse and buggy about noon the previous day, and told him to be a good boy, as he might not see him again. He was seen again, but it was in a deathly stupor, and he was the eldest son who made the discovery. Newell had gone to one of the neighboring towns or villages, purchased a quantity of lard (50 cents worth), it is supposed, for the remaining portion of the dollar was found in his pocket; returned to the unsuccessful farm, unlocked his horse and turned the animal into the field, climbed upon a stack outside the barn and effected an entrance to the building, opened the door and backed his buggy in, and then ascended to the loft and laid down to die.
