

LOOK FOR CUT IN ONTARIO POLICE

Border Citizens Predict Smaller Enforcement Staff

PRESENT BASIS COSTLY

Two Generals Now Doing Work of Superintendent Rogers

WINDSOR, July 2.—(Special To The Free Press)—Drastic changes in the personnel and number of Ontario police in an effort to cut the expense of enforcing the Ontario Temperance Act will be one of the first moves of the

new Conservative Government, according to well-informed Windsor men, who are in touch with the situation. Where there were only two provincial officers stationed at the border before the U.F.O. Government went into power there are now six or seven. There is also the additional expense of operating and maintaining high-powered automobiles, the value of which is dubious. That the Ontario Temperance Act was enforced here with a greater degree of efficiency and considerably less notoriety before the invasion of outside officers was asserted by one of the men who predicted the change. Work that was done by Superintendent Joseph Rogers during the Whitney and Hearst regime is now in the hands of two men who served in the Great War as brigadier-generals. There are also too many "cushion jobs" in the Ontario police, it is claimed.


DEATH OF MRS. McLEAN

Wife of Post Office Inspector Succumbs To Heart Failure
The death occurred suddenly on Sunday evening at the family residence, 209 Ridout street south, of Mrs. Mary McLean, wife of Duncan J. McLean, post office inspector. 

TWENTY HORSES DIE IN \$40,000 BLAZE

TORONTO, July 2.—(By Canadian Press)—Twenty horses were burned to death and damage to the amount of \$40,000 was done this evening when fire broke out in a two-story warehouse and stables belonging to the Murray-Kay Company, of this city. George Bowring, a fireman, was struck by the branch of a hose and sustained a broken nose. The origin of the fire is unknown. The loss is covered by insurance. Valuable furniture was stored above the stables and much of this was completely destroyed.

TAKES 19 CHILDREN 165 MILES IN TAXI

Brooklyn Woman Thought Schemed Just Outside City; One Fatality Results
SCHENECTADY, N.Y., July 2.—(By Canadian Press)—When neighbors complained and forced her to move from her Brooklyn home, Mrs. Anna Siewars, who believed this town to be "just outside" of New York, bundled 19 children, a puppy and herself into a taxicab to make the journey here yesterday. At the end of the 165-mile trip several of the children were ill from exposure. Later one died. Two others are under medical care. Mrs. Siewars and the other 16 are in an almshouse. Mrs. Siewars, who cares for children whose parents, due to business or matrimonial trouble, are unable to keep themselves, had intended to purchase a farm here as a home. The police have wired the parents to come for their children.

Owen Sound Fittingly Celebrates Dominion's Birthday

3,000 ATTEND BIG EVENT

Women's Baseball Tournament Called On Account of Rain

OWEN SOUND, July 2.—The 56th anniversary of the birthday of the Dominion was fittingly celebrated here today. For weeks the celebration had been planned by members of the Canadian Legion and the Crescent Athletic Club, and their efforts were rewarded with one of the most successful functions in the history of the city. The evening was marred by threatening weather and a slight shower of rain. Sports were the feature of the day. A women's baseball tournament commenced in the morning and got as far as the final game, which was postponed until Wednesday evening. The teams which will play for the championship of Owen Sound are: Collegiate and John Harrison & Sons, Limited. The baseball game between Chesley and Owen Sound attracted a very large crowd. The score was 16 to 2 in favor of the home team. The game was held at the Colliery. There were between 2,500 and 3,000 people on the grounds during the afternoon. Fireworks at Victoria Park in the evening were exceptionally attractive and were not interfered with by the rain.

INJURIES FATAL TO MRS. A. STEPHENSON
