Road Matters and Sidewalks

The Colborne St. pavement bids fair to be a success if the drainage is all right. There is a splendid foundation of boulders which will last as long as the Via Appia. On this is laid a coat of Amherstburg limestone which bonds better than granite, then flat stone and over all the tar gravel. The substructure heavily rolled with steam roller.
