from Bay, to Bay, may with much facility discourt the whole Countrey.

From the Bay of S. Peter, round about the Weff fide of the land, till you come to the grand Bay, which lyeth on the North-fide of the Countrey; and fo from thence, till you come round, back to Trinity Bay, are abundance of large and excellent Bayes; which are y leffe known, becaufe not frequered by the English, who feldom fifs to § North-ward of Trinity Bay. And it is to be observed, that round commedieur about the Coaft and in the Bayes, there are many fmall I- flands and we lands, (none of them further off then a league from the land)both faire and fruitfull: neither doth any one part of the world afford greater store of good Harbors, more free from dangers, or more commodious, then are there built by the admirable workemanship of God; I will onely inftance 2. or three of the chiefest, for some special reasons.

Trinity Harbor lyes neere in 49. degrees North lati- Trinity Harbo tude, being very comodiously scated to receive shipping affording dim in reasonable weather, both to anchor in, & from thence good commodi to faile towards either the East, West, or South : It hath three Armes or Rivers, long and large enough for many hundred faile of Ships, to moare fast at Anchorneere a mile from the Harbors mouth; close adioyning to the Riuers fide, and within the Harbor is much open land, well fored with graffe, Winter and Summer, to maintaine ftore of ordinary cattell, besides Hogges and Goats, and it flandeth North, most of any Harbor in the land, where our Nation practifeth fifting; It is neer vnto a great Bay lying on the North-fide of it, called the Bay of *Flowers*; to which place no Ships repaire to fifh; partly in regard of fundry Rocks & Ledges lying even with the water,& full of danger; but chiefly (as I coniecture) because the Sauage people of that Country doe there inhabit: Sauages tiving many of them secretly every yeers, come into Trinity Bay Harbow, C.3 and
