Very many of our people get away from home but once during the season; and but few are in such circumstances that they cannot spare an extra dollar for such an occasion. We certainly feel convinced that those who spend even one day properly at the Falls will feel its beneficial influence, both mentally and physically, for the remainder of the season.

## WIVES AND LIFE INSURANCE.

Chief Justice Armour lately rendered a decision in re Grant, which will be of interest to the fathers of families and those who have to do with life insurance. It construes the amendments to the act securing to wives and children benefit of life insurance by virtue of which a man may declare by an instrument in writing an insurance policy to be for the benefit of his wife and children, and such policy shall be deemed a trust and shall not be under the control of the husband or creditors. The act and amendment prvide that he may by instrument in writing alter and vary the apportionment as between wife and children. Chief Justice Armour's decision makes a distinction between the words "instrument in writing" and "will" in the amendments to sec. 6 of Rev. Statutes of Ontario 136, and holds in effect that a man who has duly declared a life insurance policy to be for the benefit of his wife alone cannot by his will deprive the wife of the benefit and transfer it to his ch..dren. In the case referred to, the wife who is the widow of George R. Grant, a commercial traveller, did not claim the whole of the insurance money, but a share in it along with the children. The chief Justice, however, went further and decided that she was entitled to the whole of the money, as her husband could not by will substitute the children for his wife as beneficiaries after having first declared the policy to be for the wife's sole benefit. Brother Kerrigan's state gradually grew worse, and to-day he is confined in the same institution as his spouse. His family consists of five children, four girls and one little boy seven years old, and they are in a destitute condition.

Brothers, we hope that your branch will n. t overlook this appeal without sympathizing with this hard afflicted brother and his family of small children by contributing towards their support and God will bless our Association for such acts of charity.
