SUGGESTED POSTPONEMENT OF PROGRAM—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

In the last month the Retail Council of Canada stated "it would be desirable to defer initiation of the scale conversion process until it is clear that the U.S. is close to catching up with Canada". The Canadian Federation of Retail Grocers stated the same thing, that Canada should not convert until the Americans, our neighbours to the south, do. Loblaw companies, on behalf of the corporate chains, stated "We would recommend that the timing of retail scale conversion in Canada be set to coincide with the conversion of the industry in the U.S." I therefore move, seconded by the hon. member for Red Deer (Mr. Towers):

That the government respond to the clearly expressed wishes of those most affected by metric scale conversion and immediately take steps to halt the scheduled conversion program in the retail food stores and follow the most sensible course of a co-ordinated conversion with our major trading partner and tourist source, the United States of America.
