1968 ELECTION

Mr. Maurice Foster (Algoma): Mr. Speaker, I rise on a point of order. I want to draw the attention of the House to a very important date, June 25, next Tuesday, because that is the anniversary for at least seven members of this House of Commons who were elected some 23 years ago on June 25, 1968.

They include yourself, Mr. Deputy Chairman of Committees, and the Deputy Prime Minister. This illustrious group of members also includes the hon. member for Regina—Lumsden who is sitting down here and the hon. member for Yorkton—Melville who I guess is not in the House today, a very distinguished member. It includes also the hon. member for Davenport who sits right here but has just stepped out of the House, the hon. member for York Centre and myself.

Mr. Foster: I might mention that the hon. member for Papineau—Saint-Michel who was elected actually in a by-election in the fall of 1967 has been adopted by the class of 1968 as an integral part of our group.

I might say that 1968 was a really great year, and I think most of the members of the Official Opposition would agree with that. It was great for many reasons, but especially because we were just coming out of our country's centennial year and we showed great optimism, great hope and great confidence in our country.

As we go into this year, with all its trials, tribulations and great difficulties, I hope that we may find anew using those traditional Canadian feelings of tolerance, goodwill and understanding the hope, the confidence and the optimism that we had in 1968 and go on to build a better and even stronger Canada.
