Mr. Speaker, is that not hypocrisy? Perhaps it is not hypocrisy in the mind of the hon. member. That may be the case, but I suggest to him through you, sir, that it is hypocrisy. It is hypocrisy in its best as Canadians will demonstrate clearly when the next election rolls around.

We have said we will eliminate the GST and we will put something in its place. But when the New Democratic Party is asked what it will do in terms of eliminating the GST, the members hide underneath their desks. They run under the pool tables. They jump into the pool. They talk fast. They run away. They will not respond to the question.

But when you are an irresponsible third-party rump which is losing its appeal across this country, no wonder you would do that. And if any respectable individual would not accept what I have just said they should stand in their place and refute me in debate.

If not, they lack the intestinal fortitude and should not be afforded the opportunity to be re-elected to this Chamber of this House under the banner of a New Democratic Party member.

Finally, the North American free trade agreement. As I said earlier in my comments our trade critic, our associate trade critic, our critic for external affairs and our leader have clearly spelled out our position with regard to the North American free trade agreement.

What the problem is for the hon. member to the left is that he does not like that particular opinion but he knows that Canadians believe us and believe us to be responsible as shown most recently by the various polls that have been produced. They are quite nervous about it

I can understand that because the leader of the NDP, notwithstanding the divisions in her own caucus, notwithstanding the attack from internal labour sources and labour representatives, cannot go down to the United States and meet with the President of the United States as the leader of the Liberal Party of Canada has done, and say "Mr. President, business is business and friendship is friendship".

That is what scares the New Democratic Party members because they know in their heart of hearts and in their minds that we have carved out the appropriate public policy measures for this country to pursue.

We do not have the answer to each and every question that may come up on any given day on any particular topic, but we are not the NDP. I do not want to be the NDP because as I said earlier they practice hypocrisy at its best.

So I am going to stop now and give the hon. member an opportunity to pose a question and I will respond in kind.
