The Marquis La Cortina, vice-president of the chamber of representatives, and until recently a close friend of the premier, states that the actual financial condition is unsustainable.

It is hoped that Bulgarian statesmen will perceive the necessity of coming to a speedy and amicable settlement with their neighbor, whose friendship at the present moment is of such vital necessity to Bulgaria.

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GERMANY FEARS SERIOUS SLUMP

Sensational Reports of Financial Conditions—Lack of Employment Steadily Grows Greater.

Special Cable to The World. Copyrighted by The Toronto World and N. Y. World. BERLIN, July 6.—The Radical and Socialist press predicts economic and social trouble this winter in Berlin.

Trade may be had all around, as a serious lack of employment is starting the workers in the face. The thought is also expressed that Admiral von Tirpitz, the minister of marine, encouraged by the success of Gen. von Heeringer, the minister of war, in securing increased forces from the Reichstag, will shortly make heavy demands for the navy, especially for more big cruisers.

At 110. Two officers, three soldiers and several policemen were wounded. The strike leaders were apparently trying tonight to get the men to accept the terms, but on all sides dissatisfaction is expressed.

Recalls Jameson Raid Days. The editors of the various newspapers conferred with the Federal Union leaders tonight, with the result that the Typographical Union will publish a paper giving colorless reports without comment.

Except at the time of the Jameson Raid in 1895, and the outbreak of the war in 1899, this city has not experienced such a day of terrorism as Saturday. The chief difference was that the public displayed a greater degree of bitterness.

The rioting began when a body of strikers forced their way into the Rand Club, which particularly excited their animosity because they considered the mine owners. They completely demolished everything on the ground floor.

In the meantime from the roof tops the troops were assailed with all sorts of missiles and bullets from revolvers. After almost three hours' fighting, legions from the strike committee, who had conferred with the Federal Union and Smutz, marched through the streets under a white flag, announcing that armistice had been arranged and ordering the men to return to their homes.

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
