The proposed re-organization of the financial and accounting system was the subject of an address by Controller McCarthy at the luncheon of the Municipal Improvement Association yesterday.

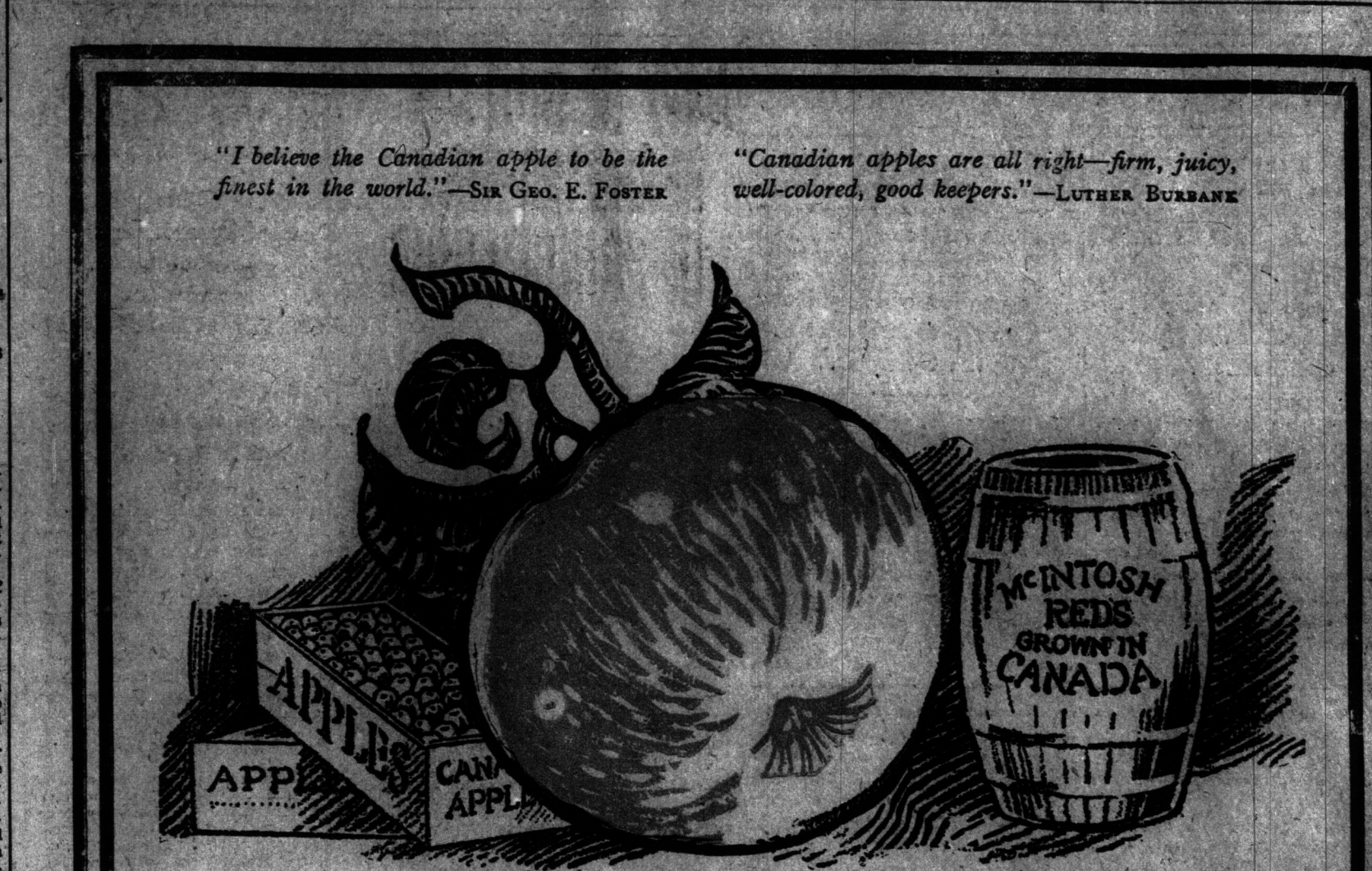
