wine Wisdom presiding over the Council suggested moderation, and the decree was not made. Not that a single doubt lingered in the mind of that holy assembly; for, in order to testify to the entire world its sympathy for the Immaculate Conception, the Council declared that it had no intention to include the Blessed and Immaculate Virgin Mary, Mother of God, in the decree which proclaims the universal propagation of original sin in the race of Adam; and it added that the Constitutions of Sixtus IV were to be maintained.

For the good sense of the people, this was sufficient; for obstinate science, it was too little: the party survived this heavy blow. In vain did St. Pius V proscribe a proposition of Baïus rejecting Mary's privilege; in vain did he give to the feast of the Conception the hitherto unheard-of sanction of a rigorous precept; in vain did he forbid, under the most severe penalties, the continuance, in any of the vulgar tongues, of a dispute which could only scandalize the people; in vain did the Sacred Congregation of the Inquisition obtain, at the request of the Spanish monarch, a decree marked with the pontifical seal, forbidding any one to affirm, thenceforward, that Mary was conceived in original sin; it was still necessary for Gregory XV to silence the adversaries once again, and to forbid them from making their debates public:

Driven back, then, into the depth of souls, the
