SAY LEMONVILLE WATER WON'T DO FOR N. TORONTO

Stouffville Runs Nearly Dry on a Portion of Flow—Big Grist of County News.

Appropos of the suggested action of the North Toronto town council to secure an additional supply of water from the Lemonville Springs in Whitechurch, it is said in Stouffville and the town to the south that it is utterly folly to think of adopting any such course.

In the first place it is charged that the present-time Stouffville itself is shy of water and lawn sprinkling has been stopped, tho the town is supplied from the best spring, and six bored wells, in the so-called artesian district. There are other springs, of course, but they are relatively of small volume. It is claimed that the supply comes from the ridges and is not artesian in its character.

Again it is said that the existing industries all along the streams presumably fed by springs are very low, and grinding and sawmill work is only carried on at stated intervals. In addition to all this the fact remains that the same interests which bitterly opposed the diversion of the water thru Whitechurch, Markham and Scarboro, will rally again should any attempt be made to interfere with what are rightly or wrongly considered vested rights.

The Village of Richmond Hill claims to possess the right to go for agreed in that direction and Mayor Brown and Engineer James of North Toronto are enthusiastic, but if the supply is not adequate for present conditions it does not look bright for these municipalities. Up thru the ridges and south of Lake Simcoe is regarded as the logical solution.

NEWMARKET.
