Annual Report of Department of Education Expresses That Belief-More Than a Million Dollars Spent in Education in 1911 in Excess of 1910.

Agricultural Courses.

The agricultural courses in connection with high schools now number eighteen. Six were added in 1911, two in New Ontario. The appointment of Mr. S. B. McCready of the Agricultural College as director of elementary agricultural education and the superintendence of school gardens is expected to produce results in the practical application of agriculture in rural schools.

produce results in the practical application of agriculture in rural schools. The short courses at the Guleph College for normal trained teachers are being continued and are bearing fruit. Mr. McCready sums up the plan now in force as follows: "To promote the work teachers are trained specially at Guleph, material is sent for gardening purposes, special grants are paid both trustees and teachers, practical help is given by the district agricultural representatives, and the teachers assisted by charts, bulletins and instruction

The amount spent upon public and separate schools in 1901 was \$9,843,202, an increase of about \$1,200,000 over the previous year. The legislature contributed about 9 per cent. of the total amount. The sources of the expenditures upon rural schools are:

Legislative grants, \$527,736; municipal grants, \$1,490,443; raised by trustees, \$1,213,815; other sources, \$332,579.

The total expenditure on high schools and collegiate institutes was \$1,636,166, of which \$1,043,585 went for salaries. The highest salary paid a high school teacher was \$3500. The average salary for principals was \$1582, an increase of \$63. The total expenditure on primary and secondary schools was nearly \$11,000,000, toward which the legislature contributed \$981,568. The province expends over 25 per cent. of its total expenditures for all purposes on education. This is compared with 19 per cent. In New Brunswick, 23 per cent. in Nova Scotia, and 14 per cent in Manitoba. In 1911 the legislative grants to education in New Ontario were \$190,000. and the policy of advancing money, upon inspectors' recommendations, for erecting school buildings in the north was continued. For this purpose \$7000 was spent.

Free Libraries.

The free public libraries in Ontario number 131 with an income of \$310,188. The number of readers was 143,764, and the books issued 2,783,439. Up to April, 1911, Mr. Andrew Carnegie contributed \$1,536,500 toward library buildings in Ontario. The first professional school for training librarians in this province was held during 1911, and was successful.
