

GRAND JURY FINDS FAULT WITH FARM

Says Coal is of Poor Quality and Cattle Not of Good Breed.

SOCIAL DISEASE CASES

Indeterminate Sentences Advised for People Found Inflicted.

In the report of the grand jury, presented to Judge Winchester in the general sessions yesterday, an attack is made on the jail farm, which the jury visited. Attention was called to the large amount of slate and stone now being delivered to the furnace room, and the jury thought that some carelessness was taking place in the acceptance of this material with no claim for refund. It also stated that the cattle in the stable were found to be of not such good breed as had been expected, and they were also found to be verminous. The woman's farm was also visited and it was thought that these buildings should be situated on a corner of the men's farm with ten acres fenced off. "There are five persons," the report states, "and they have in attendance three superintendent, five matrons, and one guard, which we consider an unnecessary amount of help, and also find that the superintendent is a man, whom we do not think advisable. We think this place should be used for the feeble-minded, retaining those who are in the Queen Street Asylum."

They considered it unfortunate that so many cases of theft and receiving should come from this place, in many instances the accused men holding positions of trust.

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PRISONERS ATTEMPT ESCAPE FROM JAIL

One of the Guards Was Beaten Into Unconsciousness Before Help Arrived.

A daring attempt to escape from the Toronto Jail was made Monday night by a number of prisoners. Jailer Arthur Busted, who was on duty at the time, was beaten into unconsciousness by the men seeking to escape. Speaking to the press after the affair H. Abby, the head turnkey, stated: "At least half a dozen prisoners are known to have participated in the attempt, and it is believed that several others will be discovered to be implicated." The attempt to get away was made about 7 o'clock in the evening in what is known as the bad prisoners' tier, which is isolated from the rest of the building by massive iron gates. At the time the attempt was made there were eighteen prisoners in the building. Guard Crowe telephoned the nearest police station and reinforcements were immediately sent to restore order. It is not long since the number of guards at the institution was cut down, some being dismissed and others pensioned. A full investigation will take place.

WHEEL TAX BILL DOES NOT GO THRU

Toronto's Measure to Secure Revenue Voted Down in Municipal Committee.

TWO BAD FEATURES

Difference Between Motor and Horse-Drawn Vehicle Tax Noted.

Toronto lost out before the municipal committee of the legislature yesterday when its bill to amend the municipal act in order to secure additional revenue by means of a wheel tax was defeated by a large majority. R. C. Harris, works commissioner, said there was a heavy expense in the bill which would bring in some \$80,000. Two bad features were discovered by George H. Gooderham, namely the difference between the tax upon motor and horse-drawn vehicles and the point as to whether the city or the province should get the revenue. William Proudfoot moved that the clause referring to horse-drawn vehicles be struck out, but this was lost and the other clause was carried over.

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
