DIPLOMACY AND NOT CLUBS NEW HANDLING FOR RAILWAY

Mayor Coatsworth Explains That City is Not Yielding to the Street Railway.

The fact that the city, contrary to the practice, that has been followed for close on two years past, has allowed a fortnight to go by without putting a writ against the street railway for \$10 a day for failure to carry out the agreement with the city, does not mean that the city is conceding anything to the company. So says Mayor Coatsworth of a report published in an evening paper, which he considers somewhat misleading.
