London, May 26.-(N. Y. Herald caole.)—In the political world matters were never more interesting than at the present moment. The visit of the German burgermeisters left people here quite cold. Emperor William's effort to imitate the French course of action toward this country has not resulted in like effects, for the conditions are quite dissimilar.

As a highly intelligent diplomatist said to me recently: "The bitter Anglophobia existing in Germany is confined to the court and its surroundings; but is not seconded by the more solid part of the country; whereas, in England, from the King to the potboy, Teutonophobia has become a perfect epidemic, from which none have escap-

This diplomat's opinion is most fully confirmed by what I hear from all sides. Rightly or wrongly, preferably the latter, the entire British nation is to-day convinced that Germany is only waiting a propitious moment to strike a death blow at England's trade, even
