

WARD'S BUSINESS GROWTH REMOVES NEED FOR PARTNERSHIP

So Controller Hubbard Informs Deputation of Ladies—Important Money Rules

The request of the University Women's Club, made to the board of control yesterday that action should be taken toward establishing the much-talked-about playground in the East End, was met by Controller Hubbard's assertion that the need of such a playground would soon be passed.

The controller declared that conditions in the ward were undergoing a decided change, business houses having begun to locate in the section and he was confident that in five years' time, the ward, as formerly an Agnes-street, would be entirely a business district.

The mayor informs the deputation that the board would do nothing in the case of the playground until the re-annexation taken by the parks committee.
