

LONDON NEWSPAPER COMMENTS ON WEDNESDAY'S LOVE FEAST

St. James' Gazette Wants to See Stars and Stripes Alongside Union Jack—Globe is a Little Sombre, Westminster Gazette Good-Natured and Times Playful.

London, June 6.—Appreciation of the cordiality of the sentiments Americans and British are now so frequently exchanging in the border of the comments of the afternoon newspapers on yesterday evening's Chamber of Commerce banquet. The St. James' Gazette is so friendly that it advocates a display of the Stars and Stripes alongside the Union Jack on all public buildings throughout the Empire on July 4, on the same principle that English university men group the light and the dark blues (the colors of Cambridge and Oxford, respectively) when they meet.

The Globe alone takes exception to the dictum that "Commerce is the great peacemaker of the world," and thinks trade rivalry and the desire to secure new markets are liable to prove fruitful sources of trouble. The Westminster Gazette says: "Mr. Chamberlain once said it would almost be worth a great war to see the Union Jack and the Stars and Stripes floating side by side. A less martial way of cultivating good feeling between the two races is adopted when the London Chamber entertained the New York Chamber of Commerce at dinner."

The Times is rather playful. The fact that nobody returned to the yacht race, but that the Chambers stuck to their police officials, but despite this fact, Mr. Chamberlain had such a strong opinion of the daring of the prisoners that he gave the special car into the care of the most robust of the railway's employees, and at the same time had them heavily armed.
