



ARRESTED AFTER FIGHT WITH CHICAGO POLICE

Board of Health Will Support Application of Dr. Langrill for \$300 Increase in Salary.

Hamilton, June 22.—(Special.)—Harris Cohen was arrested this evening after a stiff fight by Detectives Blackley and Miller.

The members of the board of health met this evening and agreed to go by the recommendation of the committee to-morrow evening to support the application of Dr. Langrill, medical health officer, for an increase of salary from \$1500 to \$1800 a year.

WORK COOPERATED SUBURBS COMMISSIONERS WILL DECIDE

Junction Council and C.P.R. Unable to Agree Concerning Proposed Spur Line.

Toronto Junction, June 22.—Mayor Chisholm called the council together to-night for the purpose of further discussion upon the application by the C.P.R. for permission to lay a spur line from their Bruce branch across St. Clair-avenue and Keele-street to the northward.

Councillor Perfect strenuously objected to this infringement upon the town's rights, claiming that no advantage would accrue from the laying of the spur, but rather that it would result in a traffic to the expense which the town incurred by the building of the subway, which would be to accommodate the I.R. debt which still hangs as a millstone around the town's neck.

Councillors Hain and Hyding were equally enthusiastic in opposition. The question will now be taken up by the railway commission on Saturday. E. E. DuVernet will assist Town Councillor Anderson in contesting the application.

DIPHTHERIA EPIDEMIC IN SCHOOLS. Foreign Population in "Word" is Principally Blamed.

Yesterday morning Dr. Sheard issued instructions to Inspector Hughes to close two rooms in Bolton-avenue School on account of diphtheria cases discovered there.

Eight cases have been reported from the McCaul-street School, seven from York-street, eight from Victoria-street School, and, owing to the large number of kindergarten pupils in Elizabeth-street School, Inspector Hughes was forced to close these classes some time ago.

P. C. Lavelor of No. 3 division, and his wife are also among the sufferers. Dr. Sheard, when questioned as to the outbreak in Bolton-avenue School, said it is not serious. Vaccination is now in hand, and the summer closing will prevent further contagion.

"Yes, there are reported cases from other schools," said the doctor, "but they are chiefly confined to the ward schools; they are never entirely free from cases of diphtheria."

It is a greater wonder that there are not more, when we consider the crowded state of that part of the city. There has been a considerable influx in that neighborhood, the poorest people of all countries—Swedes, Jews, Poles, Italians and others—are found there.

Not Cochrane But Blair. London, June 22.—A somewhat curious circumstance in connection with Lord Dundonald's name in the Glasgow Gazette, is that while the family name is nominally Cochrane it is really Blair, and the name Blair is said to have ended with an heiress, Elizabeth, in the seventeenth century. She married a younger son of the equally old family of Blair, and he took her name and arms.
