dropping in occasionally to our meetings. We are convinced that nothing will supply the lack of coming personally into contact with those whom the mission aims at benefitting. We could not over-estimate the valuable assistance rendered to us by the teachers. Through their kind co-operation we have succeeded in gaining access to not a few homes otherwise unknown to us. Indeed in some instances they have induced the most hopeless cases to attend our meetings, some of which appear now promising.

Before closing this report we must make reference to the high esteem in which our predecessors were held by all with whom they came in contact. We look upon it as a privilege to enter on the labours of those who were so highly appreciated in the neighbourhood. We trust our labours will also be fruitful with some results, though we cannot hope to follow in their foot-steps but a great way off.
