## BASEBALL.

The Canadian League has been reduced to these four clubs—London, Woodstock, Hamilton and Guelph. There was a meeting of the league magnates at the Tecumseh House last evening. Those present were Messrs. Cal Davis and W. Stroud, of Hamilton; Stone, of Chatham; Sheere, of London; and Black, of Guelph. St. Thomas was not represented. The meeting was made necessary by the expulsion from the league of the St. Thomas club, for refusal to pay the guarantee. A five-club league was considered, but Chatham's mileage handicap stood in the way, and at Mr. Stone's suggestion the Chatham club was allowed to withdraw, and their guarantee of \$150 was refunded. The new Canadian League series begins today, and will consist of 60 games—30 at home and 30 away. The schedule so far as arranged at last night's meeting is as follows:

July 5 and 6, Guelph at London; Woodstock at Hamilton; July 7 and 8, London at Woodstock; Hamilton at Guelph; July 10 and 11, London at Guelph; Hamilton at Woodstock; July 12 and 13, London at Hamilton; Woodstock at Guelph; July 14 and 15, Hamilton at London; Guelph at Woodstock. President Davis will complete the schedule. The season closes Sept. 14.

**A PHENOMENAL RECORD.**

Up to and including Monday's two games, London has played 48 championship games on the home grounds. They have lost but one game, winning 23 and tying two with Hamilton. This is a record never before reached by any professional ball club, and one that the lovers of the game in a ball team are not by the best possible support and patronage. When one reviews the work of the home team one cannot but quietly murmur "Isn't it wonderful!" Such a record will never be equalled in this or any other city in a ball team. To bring a set of men, all clever in their profession, and train them to break in at the commencement of a season and win games uniformly, is indeed remarkable. There is only one answer to how it has been done, and that is good management. Luck is not a factor in the success, but Peter Lohman's wonderful executive capacity and brain-work is the reason. He has trained the body of men under his charge to know what the turning of an eyelid means. Harmony and friendship have had no small share in bringing the London team to the perfection they have attained. Jealousy and harshness that usually exist in a ball team are not tolerated in the London team, and this means much in winning games. The record of the London club of 1899 will be an established one that will remain unbroken for years to come, and when it is London will do it its cap. Already the major leagues have been tempting the local management with offers for some of their players, and they could dispose of two or three to their financial gain, but will not do so, preferring to give to the patrons of the game here what they think is their due.
