Quit the Game for Darkness With the Sun Shining.

Tried to Steal a Draw--Umpire Cooper Gave the Game to London.

Circus at Toronto--36 Hits and 25 Runs Scored.

If there remained in the minds of the local fans any toleration for the Hamilton baseball team, or if the team brought any shred of lingering self-respect with them yesterday, both the public toleration and the team's self-respect must have vanished completely during yesterday's contemptible exhibition at Tecumseh Park. As soon as the Hams saw they were in a fair way to lose the game, they began their usual tactics of bullying and browbeating the umpire, and a constant resort to spiteful interference with base-runners.

At the close of the seventh inning, Umpire Dailey was taken ill, and it was arranged between Captains Lohman and Dean that Cooper and Crystal should act together as umpires, each calling strikes and balls on his own pitcher, and the other umpiring the bases. At the close of the seventh the score was 5 to 3. At the close of the tenth, at 6:45, the score was 5 to 5, and Crystal, complying with Dean's demand, called the game on account of darkness. The sun was still shining, and would not set for over an hour. It was London's turn at bat, and Cooper's turn to umpire at the plate. Therefore it was Cooper's privilege to order the game to go on, which he did. Hamilton had put McCann in the

box in the ninth. Dean was evidently afraid he could not hold the London down. The latter took their places on the diamond, and the Hams walked doggedly off the field amidst a chorus of cries of "Shame!" "Quitters!" "Punkers!" and similar compliments. Cooper then gave the game to London, 9 to 0.

The first hit was secured by the home team by Babbitt, the first batter in the second inning. It was a clean drive to center. Jones followed with one of the cutest of infield hits. On this heavy batting three runs were scored. Bradford went to pieces and watched the remainder of the game from the players' bench. But the thanks of the Londoners was as much due to Elton, Dean and Hagerty as Bradford for the three runs. Dean made a bad fumble in trying to catch Jones at second. Elton was not playing his position properly, and failed to cut Cope off at first. Jones scored on Dean's fumble. Then an amusing incident occurred. Conwell threw the ball to the mystified Bradford, but George didn't see it coming, and allowed the top of his head to get in the way. At the contact of the two spheres Jones saw his chance and stole third. Franks got a base on balls, and Swartz was hit by a pitched ball, forcing in Jones. Croying to Hagerty, who threw high in trying to catch Cope at the plate. Then Dean called Baker to the box. Howell flew out to Congalton, who made a beautiful throw to Conwell, retiring Franks. Mohler struck out. In the fifth inning two runs were made without a hit, and after two men were out, Phillips failed to hold a grounder sent him by McFadden, and Dean muffed a pop fly by Babbitt. The Hams again played like wooden men. Babbitt was caught by Conwell so far off first that he had no choice but to dance between the eyes, and while he was doing so, McFadden was pounding his way past Hagerty's station on a through ticket. Dean thought to head him off, and threw to Hagerty. Again Pete overestimated Shorty Conwell's height, and both runs scored as a result of the error. Four of Hamilton's runs were due to heavy hitting. Singles by Conwell and Hagerty, and a double by Schroll in the third inning were good for two runs. Elton sent the ball under the fence back of Howell's territory in the sixth, and got to third safely. He scored on a throw in. In the ninth, Hagerty singled and Dean lined out a three-bagger. Mohler, in an attempt to cut Dean off at third, threw the ball over the bag while Cope was several feet away. Score:

DECLINE OF A JOCKEY.

London, June 6.--The fickleness of popularity is beginning to demonstrate itself in the case of Tod Sloan, whose recent failures have wrecked many of his supporters. His big backers, like Riley Gannan and the Dwyers, have pocketed their losses like true sportsmen, and have retired to America. It is the small fry who while Sloan succeeded, reaped a harvest and are now losing, cannot find words enough to denounce him. Some of these, on returning from Epsom, filled the corridors of the Hotel Cecil with the rantings on the honesty of Sloan's Oaks failure, until the hotel officials had to remonstrate. Col. Tom Ochiltree declares himself a heavy loser. He thinks Sloan is a great jockey for five furlongs, but when everyone expects him to win, and backs him heavily he is left at the post, and that in no other way in the world could he have lost the Oaks. In spite of the clatter of disgruntled losers, Sloan maintains hope of ultimate success this season. Of 103 mounts he has won 37, while Otto Madden heads the list with 50 wins out of 261 mounts; and Loates has won 45 out of 301 mounts, so Sloan has won 35 per cent of his races, and the best English jockey has only won 19 per cent.

The owners of Star Pointer, Joe Patchen, John R. Gentry, Searchlight and Anacoda have made an agreement to start their horses in a special race on Friday, June 21, at the Detroit grand circuit meeting, for a purse of \$2,000, mile heats, best two in three.

At Florence, Ala., a 3-year-old filly, driven to town by her owner, was proceeding up the main street, when a brass band suddenly proceeded to pour forth its blaring melody. The mare thereupon dropped dead in the shafts of the trap to which she was attached. A veterinarian was called to hold a post-mortem, and pronounced the cause of death heart failure, due to the excitement promoted by the sudden and unaccustomed breaking forth of the brass band.
