ASHES FOR FUEL.

Toronto Globe: The attendance of fortune on the man who waits is shown by the good luck that has fallen to all who have indolently allowed their ashheaps to accumulate during the winter. The secret of using ashes for fuel is out to the world, and in kitchens, celars and boiler-rooms all over the country coal consumption is cut down and the ashes problem is solved. The new process consists simply in dampening the ashes with brine, which is compounded, according to the formula of two handsful of salt to a pail of water. The damp ashes is mixed with onequarter of its bulk of coal, and the whole mass burns with an intense heat, leaving but little secondary ashes, and causing but little soot, gas or smoke
