BIG CHICAGO PLANTS AT STANDSTILL BY SHORTAGE OF COAL

150,000 Workers Are Idle Because of the Great Blizzard.

Chicago, Jan. 15.—Nearly 150,000 men were idle today in Chicago and nearby districts on account of a fuel shortage caused by the heavy snowfall which demoralized railway traffic last Saturday, Sunday and Mondaiy. Among the industries which were practically at a standstill were three of the largest packing plants in Chicago and many steel mills in the Calumet and Gary districts, which are working on Government contracts.

Thousands of the packing house employees, who were laid off yesterday, were put to shoveking snow in order that the railway tracks might be cleared sufficiently to admit shipments of coal into the plants today. It was announced that the packers expected to resume during the day, but the situation at the steel mills was said to be more serious, and that operations might be suspended for two days at least.
