

BRITISH ELECTIONS BOOKED

LONDON, Nov. ,14 .- (British Wireless Service) .- A proclamation will be issued on November 25, summoning a new parliament, the Right Hon. Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer and Government spokesman, announced in the Commons today.

Nominations will be made on December 4 and polling will take place on December 14. The date for the counting of the ballots will depend on a bill of the House. If this bill passes without amendment, the counting can be postponed until December 28.

Prorogation of Parliament will take place on Wednesday or Thursday of next week at the latest.

On Monday an address will be presented to the King and moved in both houses of parliament in regard to the war, and after the House assembles on Tuesday an adjournment will be made to the royal gallery, where the King will receive the members of both houses.

The men will ask that the police commission be increased to five members, and will suggest that one of their number be allowed to sit upon the board when matters of vital importance are being discussed, and that the practical viewpoint of the constable may be presented.
