

BERLIN'S NEW GOVT. GIVES ITS PROGRAM

Berne, Nov. 14.—A dispatch received here from Berlin says the new Government has published its program in a decree. The dispatch adds that the program enforces many modifications toward democracy and liberty, economically and politically.

Victims of the fighting during the last year inside greater Berlin shall be buried together in the cemetery where the victims of the 1848 revolution are buried.

The decree announces that the state of siege has been raised, that there is to be full liberty for all, even functionaries of the state, and that the censorship is abolished; there is to be freedom of speech, of writing, of assembly, of political offences, annulment of the law of work day and universal direct, secret suffrage, with proportional representation for each elector above twenty years of age, for election to all public bodies.

GOVERNMENT REPORT OF FOODS IN STORAGE

OTTAWA, Nov. 14.—The report of the cost of living branch to the minister of labor of goods in cold storage up to November 1 shows a decrease in the amount of butter as compared with October 1, but a 5 per cent more on the same date a year ago. Cold storage than on the month previous, while pork, fresh and cured, and 15 per cent less than a year in their respective cases, shows a slight increase over last month and last year, month, but less than a year ago.

BRITISH ELECTIONS BOOKED FOR DECEMBER FOURTEENTH

LONDON, Nov. 14.—(British Wireless Service).—A proclamation will be issued on November 25, summoning a new parliament, the Right Hon. Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer and Government spokesman, announced in the Commons today.

Nominations will be made on December 4 and polling will take place on December 14. The date for the counting of the ballots will depend on a bill of the House. If this bill passes without amendment, the counting can be postponed until December 28.

Prorogation of Parliament will take place on Wednesday or Thursday of next week at the latest.

On Monday an address will be presented to the King and moved in both houses of parliament in regard to the war, and after the House assembles on Tuesday an adjournment will be made to the royal gallery, where the King will receive the members of both houses.

VERSAILLES MAY BE PLACE OF PEACE CONVENTION; WILL FOLLOW BRITISH ELECTIONS

British, Italian, Grecian and Serbian Delegates Already Way For Preliminary Discussion of Terms Which Are To Regulate the Whole Agitated World.

PARIS, Nov. 14.—(By the Associated Press).—It is probable that the first meeting of the peace conference will be on December 15, after the English parliamentary elections, and at a time which will give ample opportunity for the American and other delegates to arrive. A meeting to be held shortly of the inter-Allied conference will finally determine the details of these questions.

Premier David Lloyd George and Foreign Minister Balfour of Great Britain, Premier Orlando and Foreign Minister Sonnino of Italy, Premier Venizelos of Greece and Foreign Minister Faschich of Serbia are on their way here for a conference at the home of Colonel Ian H. House, representative of the United States Government, and the sessions at Versailles.

Paris, Nov. 14.—(By the Associated Press).—The feeling of the associated governments is that Versailles—virtually part of Paris—is the most convenient place to hold the peace conference, and if this was decided upon it would be a recognition of the paramount position of France in the war.

In addition to these considerations there are certain practical ones of telecommunication facilities and easy access to the sea, and the ample living accommodations, as cities in Holland and Switzerland. Agents of the various Allied countries already are making large houses in the city for the delegates.

Five Countries, Aside From Russia, Affected.

ANARCHY AMONG TEUTONS

German Soldiers Undertake To Free Brussels and Hoist Red Flag.

Washington, Nov. 14.—Reports have reached the state department that the situation in Germany, and in Austria-Hungary, is becoming a state of anarchy on account of the conduct of returned soldiers released from the fighting lines.

In Switzerland, a general strike has been called, and emissaries of the Red government of Russia have been driven out by military force. In Sweden, organs of the independent Socialists have published a manifesto calling for a Socialist government and a republic.

In Holland the Socialists are urging Russian methods in getting rid of the army.

Socialist organs in Spain again are causing the Government worry by their flaming appeals to organize a new government.

Russian Reds have adopted a program of assassination.

FOCH WILL TAKE OVER HUN FORTS ON SUNDAY NEXT

German Evacuation of France and Belgium Began on Tuesday.

CARRYING OUT TERMS German Officers Sent to Supply the Information Demanded by Allies.

PARIS, Nov. 14.—By the Associated Press.—German troops began to evacuate France and Belgium on Tuesday. The Allied troops then moved forward, the American troops in the direction of Metz and Strasbourg.

Marshal Foch, commander-in-chief of the Allied armies, will make a solemn entry into these German fortresses on Sunday in the presence of President Poincaré and Clemenceau. The marshal will ride into the cities on "Crosby," his favorite carriage.

It is probable that the re-taken territory will resume its old names, namely, Bas Rhin, prefecture of Strasbourg, and Moselle, prefecture of Metz. The Government already is considering the establishment of provisional administrative arrangements.

The occupation of the territory on the left bank of the Rhine and the bridgeheads will not be undertaken until the Allied forces enter the cities.

The liberation of Belgium promises to be rapidly accomplished. On the occasion of the re-entry of the Belgian sovereigns into Brussels, the French Government has decided to present to the queen the grand cordon of the Legion of Honor and the heir-apparent the chevalier's cross and the cross of the Order of the Lion.

In conformity with the agreement, German delegates to the armistice have been allowed to the enemy's five days over all the armament stipulated in the truce.

The French command asked the Germans for information on the signing of the armistice, has been granted to the Alsace and Lorraine, Luxembourg, and the German command has directed the Germans to send officers to the king of the Belgians at Brussels to give information regarding the German and Luxembourg railway and canal systems and the navigation of the Rhine.

The Germans today are sending an officer to China to arrange with French officers for the handling over of the arms and material which Germany has to surrender.

PARIS, Nov. 14.—The revolutionary movement is spreading strongly in East Prussia. A semi-official dispatch from Berlin reports that Koenigsberg, Allenstein, Insterburg, Gumbinnen and Loetzen are in the hands of the revolutionists.

Governor von Batocki of Posen, former German food minister, has put himself at the disposal of the revolutionists.

SWISS TROUBLE ENDED.

PARIS, Nov. 14.—The only news received from Switzerland up to a late hour this evening was a dispatch saying that President Calonder had announced in the national council that the agitation had ceased and the troubles in Switzerland were ended. No Swiss newspapers have reached Paris in the last two days.

SPAIN NEAR REVOLT.

MADRID, Nov. 13.—(By the Associated Press).—Republican meetings were held here and at Barcelona last night. Alejandro Lerroux, the radical leader, delivered an address in Madrid. Some arrests were made as a result of demonstrations.

STRATFORD WANTS GUN.

STRATFORD, Nov. 14.—The park guard has decided to make application to the Government for one of the guns captured by the Canadians. If secured, he placed in Riverside Park.

FIRE LAST CANADIAN SHOT AT BOCHES

GENERAL E. W. B. MORRISON, C. B., D. S. O., of Ottawa, chief of the Canadian artillery staff, who fired the last gun before Mons just before the armistice came into effect.

WINNIPEG AVERAGES 300 CASES DAILY OF SPANISH INFLUENZA

Churches Remain Closed Sunday Despite Desire To Give Thanks.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 14.—With steady persistence the Spanish influenza, continuing its ravages in Winnipeg, the daily average of approximately 300 cases was maintained again yesterday, when 222 cases and 17 deaths were reported to the local health board. The death toll was the lightest for four days.

Since the malarial first struck the city 6,612 cases have been reported, with 364 deaths.

Although the health officials refused to permit the churches to observe next Sunday as peace thanksgiving day, indignation was given that the influenza has not yet been put under control.

STRAITFORD, Nov. 14.—Three local soldiers arrived home today, namely, Gunner Ivan Gordon, son of J. H. Gordon, and Ptes. A. W. Polley and D. Parkinson. Pte. Polley was one of five brothers in service, one of whom has been killed.
