JAPAN DENIES THAT WAR WITH CHINA IS LIKELY BRITISH LABOR PARTY CRITICIZES LLOYD GEORGE'S PROGRAM SIR ROBERT BORDEN OFFERED U. S. AMBASSADORSHIP, IS REPORT

VISCOUNT NORTHCLIFFE IN ATTACK ON LLOYD GEORGE REFERS TO PREMIER AS A "POLITICAL CHAMELEON"

Labor Program of British Premier, as announced in His Reply in Speech from the Throne, Fails to Meet With Approval of Parliamentary Labor Party, Who Describe the Promises Made as Vague.

London, Feb. 12.—While the press generally approves of Premier Lloyd George's labor program, it fails to satisfy the parliamentary Labor party, which has prepared an amendment to the reply to the speech from the throne, regretting the absence of definite proposals dealing with "the present cases of industrial unrest and for securing, as regards wages and working hours, conditions of labor which will establish a higher standard of life and social well-being for the people."

Regarded as Vague.
Lloyd George's proposals are also adversely criticized by the radical section of the press, which regards them as vague and unlikely to be carried out by what is alleged to be a "reactionary Parliament."

The miners want a six-hour day and a 30 per cent increase in wages, while the transport workers demand a 44-hour week and a wage advance of 20 per cent. While the Northcliffe newspapers generally approve of the Lloyd George program, the premier is openly attacked by Viscount Northcliffe in a new weekly published today. The attack is in an article sent to the publication by cable by Viscount Northcliffe, who is in

Southern France. Lloyd George is said to be a "political chameleon" who lacks force to compel the Tories and their allies in Parliament to accept needed reforms. The premier is accused of waiting for the newspapers to tell him what to do.

Situation Reaches Crisis.
The labor situation reaches a crisis today in conferences between the Government and three great unions representing 1,500,000 workers, the result of whose demands is awaited with keen interest by the entire labor world. The unions are the Miners' Federation of Great Britain, membership 800,000; National Union of Railwaymen, membership 400,000, and the National Transport Workers' Federation, membership 250,000. The unions are acting together, and it is believed they have agreed on joint action if dissatisfied with the result of the conferences.

Demand 48-Hour Week.
The railwaymen's demands include a 48-hour week and control of railways by representatives of the management and workers. This latter clause is considered a step toward nationalization, but an alternative has been prepared in the shape of a union of labor delegates and boards of directors.

BORDEN IS OFFERED AMBASSADORSHIP TO THE UNITED STATES

London Daily Express Says Canadian Prime Minister Is Mentioned for Post.

OTTAWA UNINFORMED
No Knowledge of Sir Robert's Intentions Available at No. 10 Downing Street.

SIR ROBERT'S REPLY IS MERELY A SMILE.
Paris, Feb. 12.—Sir Robert Borden, when interviewed today regarding a report from London connecting his name with the British ambassadorship to the United States, thought a moment, and then replied with a smile: "I do not believe I have any observations to make regarding the report."

While no official announcement has been made of the refusal of the British ambassadorship in Washington by Lord Robert, Cecil, to whom it had been offered, it is known that Lord Robert is not inclined to accept the post for personal reasons.

NO INFORMATION AT
NUMBER 10 DOWNING
STREET ON THE OFFER.

London, Feb. 12.—Inquiring at 10 Downing street today regarding the Daily Express report that Sir Robert Borden had been offered the American ambassadorship, a representative of the Canadian Associated Press was told: "We know nothing whatever about it. It doesn't sound very probable, but we shouldn't like definitely to deny it. We have heard absolutely nothing."

The correspondent adds that while the report may seem surprising there is not the least doubt that several leading statesmen are firmly convinced and have privately expressed the conviction that Canada is bound to bear a predominant influence in promoting the Anglo-Saxon entente.

Sir George Grey, Canadian high commissioner, also stated that he had no information, nor have the officials of the colonial office.

WOULD SIR ROBERT
ACCEPT IS THE
QUESTION ALL ASK.

Ottawa, Feb. 12.—Wide interest has been aroused in Ottawa by the report from London that Sir Robert Borden has been offered the post of British ambassador to Washington. Some doubt is felt, however, whether Sir Robert would accept, should the report be true.

FOUR RUSSIAN FACTIONS TO ATTEND PRINKIPO CONFERENCE

Paris, Feb. 12.—Prospects are brightening for the assembling of at least four of the Russian factions at the conference to be held on the Princes Islands.

Word has come from the Ukraine that the Government of that former part of Russia will participate in the conference, and it is reported that the decision of the Government of General Denikin has given way to a desire to join the conference. The Government of the Crimea already has accepted the invitation as has the Russian Bolshevik Government.

It is beginning to appear that a sufficient number of other factions will be in evidence to meet the Bolshevik and the Entente and American representatives to assure the success of the conference plan.

BRITISH MINERS' FEDERATION REPRESENTING 800,000 MEN REFUSE GOVERNMENT'S TERMS

Action Is Taken at Conference Held Today at Southport—Offer of Government Is Rejected After Discussion of Proposals Outlined.

London, Feb. 12.—The conference of the Miners' Federation of Great Britain at a meeting at Southport today decided against acceptance of the terms offered by the Government for a settlement of the demands made by the federation. The Miners' Federation, which has 800,000 members, wants a six-hour day and a thirty per cent increase in wages.

When the conference met this morning President Smith announced that the committee having the matter in charge had decided against acceptance of the Government's terms. The Government's terms were discussed at the conference this afternoon, after which the conference voted to reject them. The conference adopted the following resolution: "We reject the terms offered by the Government as not being in reply to our demands, and we remit to the executive committee the duty of laying before the conference a proposal as to what should be the next step to press our demands."

EX-KAISER IS BELIEVED TO BE IN COMMUNICATION WITH HIS SUPPORTERS IN GERMANY

Secretaries of German Legation at The Hague Hold Long Conference With Former Emperor—Object of Meetings Cannot Be Ascertained, as All Proceedings Are Guarded With Secrecy.

Amsterdam, Holland, Saturday, Feb. 8.—There have been various indications during the last week that Count Hohenlohe, the former German ambassador to London, is maintaining communication with his former supporters of the German legation at The Hague. Koester and Schellbach, visited the castle at Amerongen and stayed overnight, having a long conference with Count Hohenlohe and Hans von Gontard, the sole remaining high functionary of the imperial court, who remains faithful to the former emperor. Last night Baroness von Rosen, the English wife of the German minister to Holland, arrived, and she is still at the castle today.

Everything Kept Secret.
The object of these meetings cannot be ascertained, as everything is kept secret under the influence of Herr von Gontard, who declines to permit any of his followers to be taken from his hands. With him is a minor functionary of the former German court, Count von Knapf. Herr von Gontard is the only member of Count Hohenlohe's suite to lodge at the castle. Gen. von Esdorff, Capt. von Isenmann and Dr. Forster, who is in attendance on the former emperor, have rented a house outside.

Further departures of the former emperor's domestics occurred during the last week, some of them, however, being replaced by new arrivals from Berlin. The German Government has given notice to all state servants in attendance on the former emperor and his wife that they must place themselves at the disposal of the Government by April 1 or forfeit all claims for pensions. Countess Keller still remains with the former emperor.

British Columbia Timber Mills May Close While Borden's Govt. Remains "Asleep at the Switch"

Premier Oliver Wires Sir Thomas White That Mills of Western Province Have Practically No Orders Because Tonnage for Possible British Business Has Not Been Provided—Charges Ottawa Government With Inactivity to Arrange for Transportation Facilities for Overseas Lumber Trade.

Victoria, B. C., Feb. 12.—According to information received by Premier Oliver, from credible sources, unless the lumbermen can get new orders within three weeks most of the British Columbia mills will have to close down, as they cannot get tonnage for possible British business.

Yesterday the premier sent the following message, in part, to Sir Thomas White, minister of finance:

"I am informed that British Columbia saw mills have practically no orders for lumber and that unless orders can be secured nearly all mills will be closed down inside of three weeks. If this is done the result will be very disastrous."

"From information which I have received I am led to believe that the British timber controller is calling for tenders from American brokers on the Pacific coast. Should the brokers succeed in obtaining this contract, we shall feel that this result will have been caused by lack of persistent effort on the part of your Government to secure the necessary tonnage. We have a difficult situation facing us here, and we feel that it would be an abominable shame if, through lack of effort on the part of your Government, British Columbia fails to secure this business."

SOLDIERS' COMMUNITY MAY BE ESTABLISHED IN THE NIAGARA PENINSULA FRUIT DISTRICT

R. Home Smith Submits Proposal to Toronto Advisory Board Under Soldiers' Settlement Act—1,200 Acres Owned by Mr. Smith Available for the Purpose.

Toronto, Feb. 12.—R. Home Smith has submitted a proposal to the local advisory board under the soldiers' settlement act, which may result in the establishment of a community of soldiers on some 50 farms in the Niagara Peninsula. All of these would be fruit farms. Mr. Smith is owner of 1,200 acres of fruit farms near Niagara and within 10 miles of the city. He has on the land, which is already planted with peaches, plums, cherries, apples, and other fruit, a road which runs through the land, which is 10 minutes' ride from Niagara, and 25 minutes from St.

Catharines. Yesterday Mr. Smith visited the Ontario advisory board and suggested that this land be sold exclusively to soldiers. He asked for the approval of the board, who said they would investigate the suggestion. If the price is reasonable, they thought there would be no objection.

"It will be all revealed," said Mr. Smith. "I will get it down to a first-class basis. The plan is to be sold for the land would be under \$5,000, which is the maximum amount which the Government is allowed to purchase of farm lands under the act."

FRANCE WOULD HAVE GERMANY PAY TO LIMIT DAMAGES WILL BE ASSESSED BY FRENCH AGAINST FOE COVERING ENTIRE WAR OUTLAY.

Paris, Feb. 12.—The reparations commission of the peace conference has before it, according to the Temps, three propositions as a basis for the assessment of claims against Germany. It is against Germany's proposal to assess the reparations on the basis of the war, national and individual, from the war, in addition to the reparations for military purposes. The British plan, proposed by Premier Hughes of Australia, gives no preference to any class of claims. The American plan proposes to assess the reparations on the basis of the damage and devastation by German armies, it is said.

Total claims under the first two plans are estimated at a thousand million francs. The American plan would reduce the total to an amount Germany probably will be able to pay. It is asserted by the newspaper, The French plan is a basis of discussion, but the whole subject is still open.

BOLSHEVİK FORCES SECURE SUPPLIES STORES OF FOOD, COAL AND MUNITIONS IN HANDS OF SOVIET TROOPS.

Washington, Feb. 12.—Large stores of food, coal, munitions and other supplies have been obtained by the Bolshevik forces along the Dvina River, according to the state department, say today. The dispatches did not make clear whether the stores were captured by the Soviet troops or were abandoned by the Czech-Slovak and loyal Russians.
