

SHARP DISCUSSION OVER AMENDMENTS TO GERMAN TREATY

D. D. McKenzie and Hon. W. S. Fielding Object.

MOST EXTRAORDINARY

Parliament Asked To Assent To Agreement Without Seeing It.

OTTAWA, Oct. 14.—A short, sharp discussion of treaty approval marked today's sitting of the House of Commons. The question arose on Senate amendments to the bill to carry the German peace treaty into effect. The effect of these amendments, as explained to the House by Hon. C. J. Doherty, was to extend the provisions of the bill so that it would apply to the treaty with Austria and also to other treaties signed by Canada. The minister of justice asked the House to assent to the amendments insofar as the Austrian treaty was concerned, but not with regard to the others.

D. D. McKenzie and Hon. W. S. Fielding thought it most extraordinary that the Canadian Parliament should be asked to assent to this agreement without having seen it.

Mr. Doherty explained that an authenticated copy of the Austrian treaty had not yet been received, but that a copy of the document as prepared for signature by the Austrian Government, and that in all fundamental it followed the lines of the German treaty. He understood that the signed treaty was practically the same as that received by the Government here.

Motion Carried.
The Government's motion carried. Third reading was given to the civil service reclassification bill and also to the bill permitting the importation, manufacture and sale of oleomargarine in Canada for a limited period.

In connection with further consideration of bills relating to the wheat board, Sir George Foster made some additional explanations as to the disposition of the Canadian wheat crop and the agreement made with the millers.

Before the House rose Hon. Arthur Meighen tabled some additional correspondence and memoranda relating to the legislation on the Grand Trunk Railway. These documents will be printed before discussion of the Grand Trunk resolution is commenced at tomorrow's sitting.

At question time the only question answered was that of Mr. Mowat, Parkdale, in respect to the importation of opium and morphine in the four years ending 1918 was much in excess of the four years previous, but the importation of opium was not abnormal.

A total of 164,787 ounces of cocaine and morphine, valued at \$867,344, and 52,898 ounces of crude opium valued at \$823,512.

Wheat Control Plan.
Sir George Foster gave the House an explanation in regard to some clauses of the regulations governing the operations of the Canada wheat board.

He explained that an agreement had been reached at a meeting of the board with the millers by which the maximum prices of \$10.10 for Ontario winter wheat flour and \$10.00 for Manitoba hard spring wheat flour were fixed. The millers would pay \$10.30 a barrel, and 10c of this sum would be held in a sort of pool for distribution after all the wheat had been disposed of.

The price of bran had been fixed at \$4.5 a ton and shorts \$5.5 a ton. At first no export had been allowed, but later it was found that the supply in Canada exceeded the demand, and some shipments were allowed to leave the country under permit.

In regard to the maximum flour price, Sir George stated that this was on a c. o. b. Montreal basis and that owing to competition he understood that there had been sales of flour at a lower price than the maximum.

Correspondence tabled.
Hon. Arthur Meighen tabled correspondence which passed between the Government and the Grand Trunk Railway prior to July 11, 1918. He also tabled a statement of the company's indebtedness, etcetera, of the system.

Mr. Denis protested against the resolution for acquisition of the Grand Trunk being proceeded with until members had had an opportunity of becoming acquainted with the contents of the documents tabled.

Hon. Arthur Meighen said that the fundamental points of the resolution could be discussed without the details being considered. The House, of course, not be required to make a final decision with regard to the taking over of the railway system until documents and papers should be examined and weighed.

In answer to a question by Mr. McKenzie, Sir George Foster said the papers regarding the Grand Trunk Railway would be printed and ready for distribution among the members tomorrow. The Grand Trunk resolution would be the order of business to be taken up.

Looks For Drastic Orders to Control Price of Clothing

TORONTO, Oct. 14.—In the opinion of J. S. Lundy, representing the attorney-general of Ontario, when W. E. O'Connor, K.C., returns from his visit to Ottawa and the evidence taken before the board of commerce in Toronto respecting the prices of shoes and clothing has been reviewed, orders of a drastic character are likely to follow. The board of commerce will sit in this city again next week.

TOBACCO GROWERS TO DEMAND HIGHER PRICES THIS YEAR

Three Hundred Meet at Ridgeway and Arrange For Several Gatherings.

RIDGECITY, Oct. 14.—Higher prices for Ontario tobacco appear to be in the offing. Three hundred enthusiastic tobacco growers met in the township hall here tonight and unanimously agreed that from all information available the price of leaf tobacco should be considerably higher than that of last year.

Arrangements were made to hold meetings throughout the tobacco-growing districts to inform the growers of facts, which, it is estimated at the meeting tonight, had usually been concealed from them by the buyers of tobacco.

DRAYTON TO INSPECT HARBOR AT KINGSTON

KINGSTON, Oct. 14.—Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, arrived in Kingston today from Ottawa and was met by a number of friends. Tomorrow morning he will go over the proposed harbor improvements here and will then leave for Toronto, where he has engagements in connection with the Victory Loan for Thursday and Friday.

REINFORCEMENTS FOR BRITISH IN TURKEY

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 14.—Two British transports have landed reinforcements on the Turkish Asiatic coast for the British contingent operating against the rebels.

ERNEST LAPOINTE TO CONTINUE FIGHT BEGUN BY LAURIER

Will Carry On the Cause of the Old Chief.

TO OPPOSE LAVERGNE

Resigns Seat in House To Run Against Bourassa's Lieutenant.

OTTAWA, Oct. 14.—In the House this afternoon Ernest Lapointe, of Kamouraska, announced that he had resigned his seat in the pending election in Quebec East. Mr. Lapointe has represented Kamouraska since 1904, since which time he has been a staunch and true follower of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and since which time he has been a consistent exponent of sound Liberalism and sane imperialism. He has resigned his old seat to fight Nationalism, the ally of the Bonaparte forces in 1911, and his opponent will be Armand Lavergne, whose assistance, on a campaign of "no participation in the Empire's war," Sir Robert Borden came to power nine years ago, and for which assistance the latter brought into his cabinet at various times half a dozen of his disciples.

Mr. Lavergne ran at the last Dominion election. He was snowed under, and thereby it may be shown that the doctrines which he has consistently preached are no longer to be tolerated in Quebec. Mr. Lapointe has resigned his seat in Kamouraska to go to battle with him. That Mr. Lavergne will be defeated is considered a foregone conclusion. Thereafter, as a foregone conclusion, he will be a free agent, and will be able to take the place of Mr. Lapointe in the House.

A victory in Quebec East will mean a victory for Mr. Lapointe that he will not only succeed Sir Wilfrid Laurier as member for Quebec East, but that he will succeed him as federal Liberal leader in the province.

It is rumored that Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, who in a few days will leave for France to visit the grave of his only son, who was killed in action, and who is not taking any part in the election, will shortly retire altogether from public life, and will accept a position of prominence in the university. Ernest Lapointe is the logical man to take the federal leadership in the province. He is a man of strong conviction, a splendid debater and orator in both languages, a sound imperialist and a great Canadian, and altogether adapted to leadership.

Mr. Lapointe has no doubt to mean the Bourassa following from the dangerous teachings of the "master" to the Liberalism of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The latter fought Nationalism to the end of his days. Mr. Lapointe and the men behind him will take up the fight over the lieutenant of Bourassa in Quebec East, though it may be that Mr. Lavergne in the circumstances will revise his decision and not run at all.

In the meantime, the Bonaparte government has in contemplation the formation of a sort of political and economic front between the big interests of Quebec and those of Ontario.

It is the young men and the common people whom Mr. Lapointe will lead.

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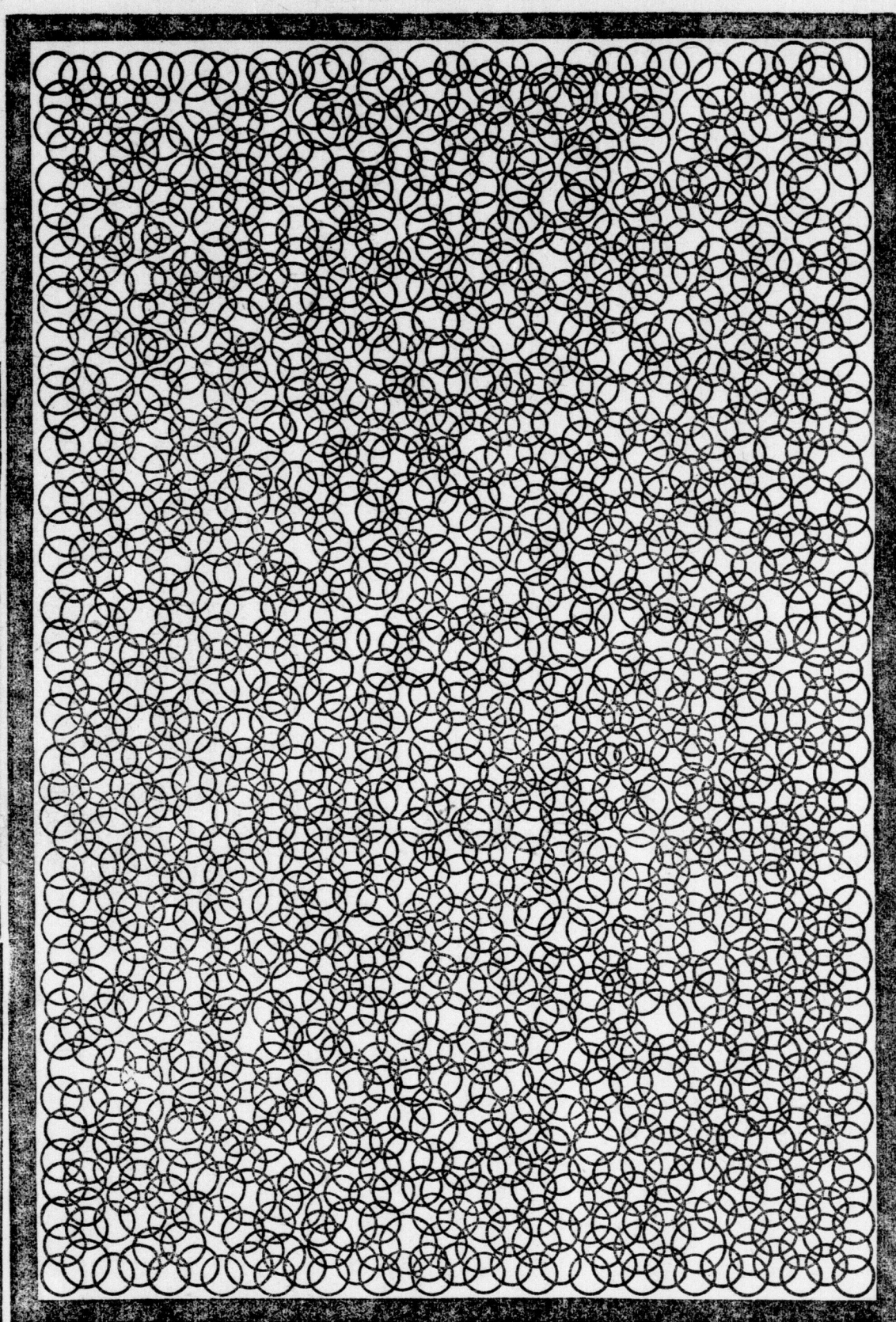
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COUNT THE CIRCLES
