## LONG SHOTS AT MONTREAL WIN THE FIRST AND FIFTH

Dress Parade II. Takes Two-Year-Old Race and Nat. Steeplechase Each at 20 to 1

MONTREAL, June 9.—(Special by Our Own Reporter.)—Montreal Jockey Club was again favored with fine weather and a fast track this afternoon, the fourth day of the spring meeting. The card of six races was not as attractive as on the previous days, although the fields were larger and included the daily steeplechase. The race thru the field brought out only a fair lot, as the majority of the first-class leppers were held out for the Prince of Wales Handicap, to be run Thursday. The best race of the afternoon was the third, a handicap for three-year-olds and upwards, at 1 1/8 miles, which brought out as good a class of horses as there is at the track, over a distance of ground. Aronck, who ran King James to such a hard finish, went to the post the first choice even after her poor race the last time out. In this event the colors of Valley Farm stable appeared for the first time in Montreal. In former years, owing to the clash between Hamilton and Montreal, the Hendee horses had to be raced at Hamilton, although Mr. Hendee would like to have sent them to Montreal to encourage the game along. The first race saw a good field of youngsters face the flag, with Setback the first choice at odds on. There was a great deal of interest evinced in the event for gentlemen riders, as always is the case. It was not favorites day, for the majority went down to defeat before second choice and long shot.

Ontario was the only first choice to land the money. Word was received at the track this afternoon that S. C. C. Hildreth would ship Montgomery here to run in the Mount Royal Handicap on Saturday, while it is likely that he will stay and start in the Windsor Hotel Cup on Monday afternoon. This will be the first time that the colors of the Hildreth stable have ever been spotted in Montreal. Summary:
