



CHATHAM, June 3.-Teoumsen's srave, which has been the subject of considerable speculation of recent years, has at last been located on St. Anne's Island, near Mitchell's Bay. Dr. Mitchell, Harry Smith and Chas. Chubb of Wallaceburg, hearing of the location of the grave went to the is-land, and were successful in digging up the bones of the great Indian war-rior. The Indians raised serious pro-test against the removal of the re-mains, but were finally pacified. The bones were removed to Wallaceburg, and are now lying in Dr. Mitchell's of-fice. His
