U.C. COMMEMORATED.

In honor and commemoration of the seventy-fifth anniversary of Upper Canada College, the Canadian Education Association has issued "An Epitaph on Canadian History—An Appreciation" by Frank Arnold, B.C. The publication is most artistic in plan and execution and reflects great credit on J. H. Woods, the designer, and G. B. Macdonald, the printer. While naturally of special interest to the eight or nine thousand of its sons who have passed through the college since its opening on Jan. 8, 1829, the book has a more general value in that it illustrates in a striking manner the wonderful growth of Canada and of Ontario during the three generations it covers. The college owed its origin to Sir John Colborne, afterwards known as Field Marshal Lord Seaton, who in 1829 "proposed the establishment of a military college on the lines of his own alma mater, Winchester. No time was lost in the matter, and the establishment of the college was announced on Jan. 8, 1829, it was opened. The name was the first on the roll and from 1829 to 1893 classical master of the school, died in the city of Canada in almost every walk of life. After enduring various vicissitudes the college was transferred to its present commanding situation and in 1893 on the advent of Dr. George H. Patterson, its present principal, the college entered upon its present prosperous epoch. Under his auspices the preparatory school was built and occupied in September, 1902 and under the present principal, Henry W. Aldrich, the college has more than doubled its position and has been recognized in England as an institution "of an order and first value to the empire and of particular value to the rising generation of Englishmen." The college is a notable "edifice" in itself and admirably fitted for its purpose, needs no further commendation than the really fine illustrations and portraits which make this commemorative publication a most attractive and suitable souvenir.

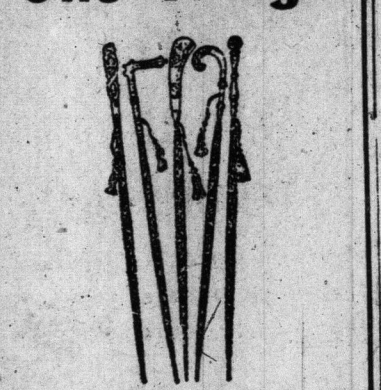
