ATHLETIC WAR BEGINS ANEW

U. and Athletic Federation is Brewing Again.

The war between the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union and Athletic Federation has begun anew, the Ottawa Citizen opening fire in the following vigorous fashion: "The Canadian Amateur Athletic Union, Canada's national amateur governing body, should never, in our opinion, have been united even temporarily with the Athletic Federation of Montreal. Mr. Leslie Boyd's betrayal of the C. A. A. U. in protesting Longboat should at least release that body from their compact, and enable them to resume hostilities in earnest. The Federation is an interloper in the amateur field, and the C. A. A. U. should never rest until they have succeeded in ousting the former body. If the Athletic Federation, which is composed of two professional organizations, and the Montreal Athletic Association, which pays many of its athletes, would confine its activities to the control of professional athletes, it would not only do a useful work, but would force the professional of the amateur field. Athletes stand now the paid athletes thanks to the Athletic Federation, it is surely crowding the amateur out of what should be (and would be if the C. A. A. U. had its way), his exclusive sphere."

SOME PROBLEMS IN AUSTRALIA

(Toronto News). What are federal rights and what are state rights, are live questions in the Australian commonwealth. Some time ago the government of New South Wales held that it was not bound by the customs laws of the federal parliament, and seized a quantity of wine getting in transit to make a test case. Mr. V. E. Freeman of the State, was Attorney-General at the time, and approved of the seizure. Now the high court has decided that the state governments are subject to the customs regulations of the commonwealth, just as individuals are. Judge Barton said: "The domain of exclusively national legislation there is no room for states or their executives. They have great power, which this court has guard and will guard. But as far as the law of the constitution is concerned, state government are supreme in their sphere and powerless beyond it. And this is also true of the Australian government in its turn."
