ALL CAN HELP TO WIN RIFLE MATCH

Solomon Cup Will be Shot for on the Rifle Range Tomorrow Afternoon.

Tomorrow afternoon, the rifle match between the three batteries of artillery composing the Third Regiment Canadian Artillery for the Solomon's Cup will be held on the rifle range, commencing at 1.30.

The conditions of the match are that each company may enter as many men as possible, but only the scores of the highest ten to count in full. To their total is added 10 per cent. of the scores of all those who make 50 per cent. (or over) of the possible, and for each man who completes an average less than 50 per cent. of the possible 1 point is added to his battery score. The ranges at which the matches are fired, five and six hundred yards, seven shots at each range, the match to be shot in uniform.

By the above rules, it will be seen that every additional man who shoots adds something to the score of his battery, particularly if he makes a fairly good score. It is therefore important that every member of the corps who can, should attend, and those who have not been otherwise notified are requested to take this as notice of the match, and be present in uniform tomorrow afternoon.

POLICE COURT

Several Interesting Cases Were Quickly Disposed of This Morning.

John Bell and Robert Murray, arrested together on Mill street, pleaded guilty to drunkenness, and were fined \$1, or ten days in jail.

Edwin Wilson paid a \$4 fine. Prior to being brought to court, his brother secured permission to visit the prisoner in a cell and gave him sufficient money to pay his fine. He himself was intoxicated and narrowly escaped being incarcerated, as he clung to the bars of the enclosure and refused to budge when an officer was despatched to acquaint the visitor with the fact that his time allowance had expired. Eventually he was forcibly ejected from the building.

Charles Cain, given into the custody of Policeman Scott last night by his brother, William Cain, on the charge of using abusive language to his aged mother and sister and acting in a disorderly manner in their house on Richmond street, denied the charges and was remanded. The magistrate said that rum was the cause of the trouble. He would be pleased to secure the names of the liquor dealers who sell to such men as Cain.

On Tuesday last, Jacob Lupee, a negro, complained to Police Clerk Henderson that James Dunlop, an elderly man who acts as caretaker on the British street dump, assaulted his little daughter with a shovel. Both Lupee and Dunlop and their counsel appeared in court this morning, but as no formal information had been laid against Dunlop, the matter was not aired.

Dunlop, for the defence, refutes all the declarations of the complainant, and states that as he was throwing a barrel of refuse over the dump the girl approached within range of a shovel he had in his hands, and she received a glancing blow on the leg. He alleges that the case is instigated for purposes of blackmail. Lupee claims his daughter is unable to attend court owing to the injuries inflicted. It is possible that information will be laid against Dunlop for inflicting grievous bodily harm. D. Mullin, K. C., for the prosecution, and H. H. Pickett for the defence.
