

WATERWORKS EXTENSION WILL COST CITY \$400,000

Exclusive of Damages, the Work Represents This Outlay-- Work Yet to be Done is Valued at About \$20,500--The Question of Damages.

The progress of the water extension to Lock Leonard has now reached a stage where some idea can be formed of the ultimate cost of the work under the contract. What the total outlay to the city will be must still remain a matter of uncertainty. No claims for damages have yet been submitted by the contractors, and the price to be paid for the properties expropriated has yet to be considered.

Leaving these questions for future settlement, the accompanying tables show that in round figures the actual cost of the contractors' work to Feb. 1 has been \$200,070.10, and that the estimated value of the work still unfinished is \$200,500, making a total in round figures of \$400,570.10.

It is believed that the contractors are warranted that they fully protect the interests of the city from a legal standpoint, and that in the great majority of cases where claims will be put in by the contractors they will be considered and dealt with rather as a matter of equity than on any other grounds.

It would therefore appear from the foregoing figures that \$400,000 will cover the expenditure if the cost of expropriated properties and damage claims is not taken into consideration.

Table one gives the total value of the work done and makes no allowance for fifteen per cent. retained by the city until after the contracts are completed.

Table two shows by sections the value of the work still uncompleted. On section 1 there is little to do beyond tramping up the surface and leveling the banks.

HIS WIFE SHOT HIM

Tragedy in Haverhill That Has Peculiar Side to it.

Haverhill, Mass., Feb. 4.—While Isaac Bonnell, a painter, was at work on the floor of the apartment of his wife, Mrs. Ida Bonnell, a palm reader, of this city, today, bleeding from a bullet wound through the chest, he accused first his wife and then A. T. Morrell, her manager, of shooting him. Bonnell was removed to the state hospital, where his wife was placed on the dangerous list, and Mrs. Bonnell was locked up on a charge of assault with intent to kill, with Morrell being also held as a witness.

Mrs. Bonnell told the police that her husband had been shot while she was on an errand on her right arm, and a bullet hole through her sleeve. She claimed that she fired at him in self defence.

When the police rushed up to Mrs. Bonnell's apartment on the second floor of 180 Merrimack street, this city, they found Mrs. Bonnell and Morrell endeavoring to staunch the blood which was pouring from the wounded man's mouth.

The police were considerably confused at the contradictory statement of the wounded man, but realizing his condition, they took him at once to the state hospital. On reaching the police station, Mrs. Bonnell stated that she had not been firing with her husband, but she had been firing at Morrell.

When he appeared in the room, Mrs. Bonnell said she was seated at a table reading, while Morrell was sitting by a window. Bonnell upon entering the room, demanded "a private reading immediately," and asked his wife to go into the back room. Mrs. Bonnell refused, but she was very angry at Morrell's presence, she decided not to go. Mrs. Bonnell said that her husband was regarded as a crack shot, and she fired at him, the bullet grazing her arm. She reached over to a table and drew a .38-caliber revolver from beneath two books.

She aimed at her husband's head and fired. Bonnell fell to the floor with a bullet wound in the chest. Both weapons were found by the police upon their arrival. Each was warm, and each had fired several shots.

Mrs. Bonnell has been in the city about six months engaged in palm reading. Nothing is known regarding her husband, nor are the police familiar with Morrell. Bonnell is about thirty-five years old, and his wife is somewhat younger, while Morrell gave his age as forty.
