

NEW TRIPOD FOR MUSKETRY TRAINING.



The handy tripod invented by Sergt.-Major Roberts, of the Grenadier Guards, for musketry instruction. It takes the place of the cumbersome poles and sandbag now in use, and has already been tried out by several overseas corps with good results. The picture on the left shows Sergt.-Major Roberts standing behind Sergt. Cuddiford, and shows how the tripod is used. The central and right hand pictures show how, by means of the universal joints, the rifle can be tilted to any angle, and thus enable the instructors see how a recruit progresses in his training.

### BERMANS SO FAR UNABLE TO AVENGE DEFEAT BY BRITISH

London, April 12—"It is a significant fact that although a month thas passed since the action of Neuve Chapelle, the enemy has made no attempt to retaliate in any quarter but has remained inactive while we have established ourselves securely on the ground won," is a declaration made by the "eye-witness" attached to British army headquarters on the continent in a communication dated April 9.

"Looking back, over the past four months, it is instructive to note the gradual weakening of the German resistance on our front. Formerly any offensive action on our part was met with an immediate counter stroke. This is the first occasion on which the enemy has made no reply at all. This does not mean, of course, that their resist-

made no reply at all. This does not mean, of course, that their resistance is collapsing, but the Germans have none the less admitted that with the troops at their disposal at this front they are unable to avenge their defeat.

## Used for Prepayment of the War Duties

The Post Office Department at Ottawa gave notice a week or two ago, in connection with the War Revenue Act, that all letters and post-cards mailed in Canada for delivery in Canada, the United States, or Mexico, and letters mailed in Canada for delivery in the United Kingdom and British possessions generally, or wherever the two cent rate applied, should in addition to ordinary postage carry a one cent stamp as a war tax, and also notified the public that such war tax, while it should be paid preferably by the postage stamp marked "War Tax," could, if such stamp were not available, he paid by an ordinary one cent postage stamp. The department
