### MEIGHEN REFERS TO DUNNING AGAIN

**Calls New Minister "Crown Prince of Saskatchewan"**  
in House Debate

OTTAWA, March 31.—The Crown Prince from Saskatchewan was how Mr. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader, referred in the House today to Hon. C. A. Dunning, with whom he had a lively interchange on Tuesday.

Mr. Meighen, at the time, was answering certain remarks made by Malcolm McLean (Liberal, Montreal) on the resolution to increase the duty on eggs entering Canada. Apparently, said Mr. Meighen, Mr. McLean thought that the interests of the Canadian poultrymen could be looked after by the reduction of freight rates. Did not Mr. McLean, however, read in the papers only a few days ago, that "this leader—the Crown Prince from Saskatchewan" was of the opinion that a general reduction of freight rates could not be obtained. Mr. Dunning was not in the House at the time.

**T. Stewart Lyon Forced by Ill Health to Leave "Globe"**

TORONTO, March 31.—The Globe will make the following announcement in its leading editorial tomorrow morning:

"The president and directors of The Globe are called upon to communicate to its readers the information that Mr. T. Stewart Lyon, who for eighteen months has been on leave of absence on account of his health has felt obliged to resign his position as editor of the Globe."

Mr. Lyon is now in the South enjoying a holiday rest. His friends will be glad to learn that his health is much improved, but he states definitely that it is necessary for him to relinquish the responsibility and arduous work of managing editorship. He asks in the letter to the board that his resignation take effect on April 1.

### Presbyterian Bill Is Given Third Reading In N. B. House

FREDERICTON, N. B., April 1.—The rather edifying spectacle of the laity, as represented by members of the Legislature, exhorting clergymen to reach a common ground of agreement on a religious matter presented itself to the corporations committee yesterday, when the bill to incorporate the Continuing Presbyterians into St. Andrew's church was under consideration.

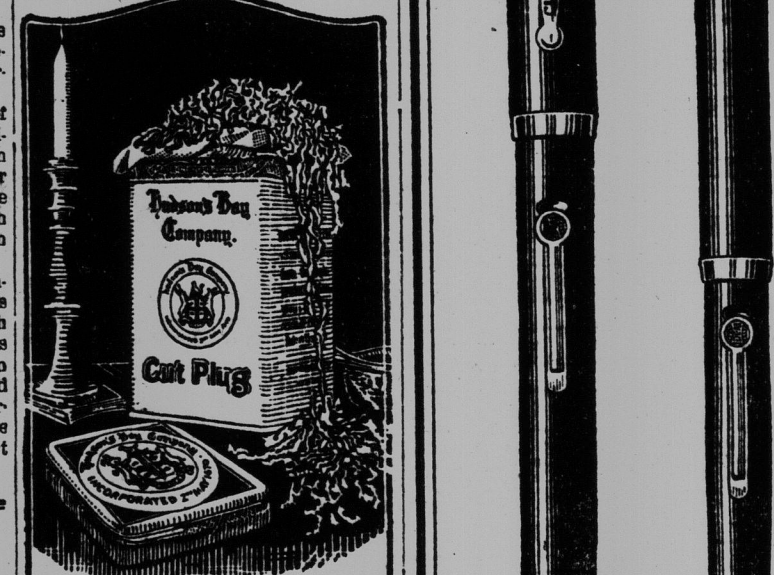
The committee went into session at 12 o'clock on the matter and two hours later after much controversy an agreement finally was reached. Several of the points in dispute during the church union matter were brought in and several suggestions by members to overcome the difference of opinion fell on barren ground. The point in dispute, at the Unionists claimed, was the inference in the preamble that the Presbyterian Church in Canada as constituted prior to Union still existed, while those for the bill declared they would never secure from them an admission in the bill that the Presbyterian Church was dead.

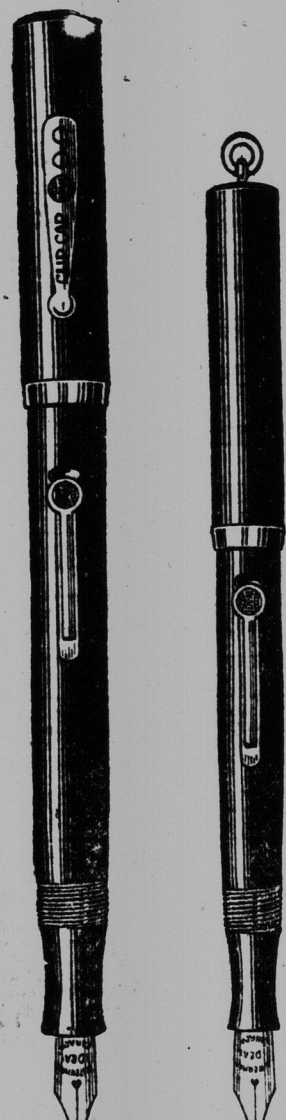
